2008 Crime Watch Report

Hi Neighbors,

Hope everyone had a great 2008. Some in the neighborhood did not. Last year crime spiked to an all time high for our area. Even with all the efforts of CRIME WATCH PATROL we can't be everywhere at all times.

The stats for Richland Park and Richland Oaks were:

Burglaries	36
Thefts from motor vehicles	33
Car Thefts	18
Criminal Mischief	28
Attempted Robberies	2

Most of the **36 burglaries** were from UNLOCKED DOORS AND WINDOWS. As to the **33 thefts from motor vehicles**, if you leave it in your car or truck you can say goodbye to it. Thieves walk our streets and alleys day and night checking door handles. If it's unlocked, they take what they can get. If you leave your purse, laptop, GPS unit, wallet, keys, anything of value, they will smash your window to get it. Guess what! Most car alarms don't go off until a door is opened, so they just reach in and grab.

Of the **18 car thefts**, I know of six that were taken in connection with home burglaries. The rest were taken off the streets and out of our driveways. Some cars even had the keys left in them.

The **28 criminal mischief** stats had to do with damage of some kind to property and here's the scary one—**two attempted robberies** in our alleys. If someone is following you up the alley and you don't know who it is, DO NOT PULL IN YOUR DRIVEWAY OR GARAGE! Keep driving and if you have a cell phone, call 911. If no cell phone, blow your horn and keep driving toward Beltline and Greenville to the Police Station.

Folks, this was by far our worst year ever, and with all the lay-offs, it is bound to get worse before it gets better. We all need to think about safety. Keep an eye out for our neighbors as well. Learn their home and work numbers to alert them and the Police if you see anything out of place. If you see repairmen, check it out. Watch for delivery people. They could just be checking doors to see if they are locked or if anyone is home. This is a common practice done on our streets every day.

There is also a **web scam** going on. They send you an email or call you asking you to take a survey from Walmart and they will credit your credit card or bank with \$150 for taking the survey. Walmart is NOT connected in any way with this survey. Don't fall for it.

We still have too many OPEN GARAGE DOORS during the day. I know, you are just mowing your yards or planting flowers out back but it only takes 30 seconds for a thief to grab something he can pawn for drugs. I was guilty of it myself recently. The motor to my electric window broke and I was trying to get the window up. Went into the house for another tool, wasn't in there 30 seconds and my phone rings. "Hey Bob, your garage door is open." It was a Crime Watch Patrol person. They just love to bust my chops. So please, let's keep those doors down.

We always need more people for Crime Watch so if you have an interest PLEASE give me a call at 214-763-0589. It is really quite rewarding and you are NEVER in any danger. I could use some late night patrollers from 10 p.m. until 6 a.m. It's not an 8-hour shift—just whatever time you can spare. Cars on the streets with Crime Watch Patrol signs really work.

Quick Tips

The latest thing going on in our neighborhood is somebody who knocks on doors (lately a tall, slender black male) along with a couple of other black males who wait in an older model blue Plymouth while the first guy asks for directions to one of the streets in the neighborhood.

Knocked on several doors on Hilton in mid-January and possibly others since.

If this happens at your home, do not open the door. You can let them know you're home and give directions through the door. However, you then need to call the Richardson Police and report it.



Then there's this from the Highland Terrace Neighborhood Newsletter . . .

On Nov. 21, 2008, a Richardson Police Officer arrested a suspect for Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle and Evading in a vehicle. **The vehicle was taken from one of the burglaries in Richland Park.**

The subject said he helps pick out houses to be hit by crews that work only during the day.

He said they knock on doors numerous times to make sure nobody is home before kicking in the back door.

If somebody answers the front door they offer to do yard work and then leave to "get their equipment" without returning.

According to the subject the group picks houses with low or no fences so they can have a good view of the back in case they need to make a fast escape.

He also said that they try to stay to the south side of the neighborhood because they can jump the wall into the nearby apartments and disappear.

City passes ordinance to help alleviate congestion on streets

Richardson City Council is hopeful that recently-passed regulations for motor vehicle overnight parking on public streets adjacent to residential lots will help reduce on-street parking and ensure that residents have a space to park in front of their own homes.

According to Don Manger, director of Neighborhood Services, excessive on-street parking in residential neighborhoods has been one of the most frequent complaints registered by residents for the past few years. The most common concerns include limited visibility, blocked sidewalks, problems maneuvering around cars and limited parking in front of one's own home.

Here is a summary of the ordinance.

It is an offense for a person lawfully in the possession of a motor vehicle to park between 2 and 8 a.m. on a public street adjacent to a residential lot unless that person is a resident or occupant of the residence.

The restrictions do not apply to motor vehicles that have stopped temporarily while the operator or passenger is making deliveries to the residence, loading or unloading passengers or goods or stopped temporarily to make emergency repairs.

“It is important to note that residents and their visitors/guests who are occupying the home overnight may park on the street adjacent to that home at any time. Under no circumstances do the new restrictions prohibit you or your visitors/guests from parking in front of your own home,” Manger said.

The ordinance will be enforced on a complaint-only basis in a joint effort between Richardson's Neighborhood Services and Police Departments. Neighborhood Services will take the lead in investigating complaints and will work with residents to achieve compliance.

Frequently Asked Questions About the New Ordinance:

Published in the February 2009 edition of "Richardson Today"

Q. Where can my family and friends park if they are visiting for the weekend?

A. Guests, such as family and friends, who are staying overnight at your home are considered occupants of your home during that time. Their vehicles can be parked on your property or on the street adjacent to your home.

Q. Will the new restrictions impact my ability to host a dinner party, church meeting or other similar event at my home?

A. No. The ordinance is intended to address overnight parking only. The new restrictions apply to parking on the street between 2 a.m. and 8 a.m. only.

Q. How many vehicles can I park on the street in front of my home?

A. Vehicles can only be parked on the street directly adjacent to your property. The number of vehicles is limited to that which may be legally parked in accordance with all applicable parking ordinances.

Q. How do I express a concern about a possible parking violation?

A. Contact Neighborhood Services between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at 972-744-4166, file a complaint online at www.cor.net/ns, or call the City's 24-hour Response Center at 972-744-4111.

Got a scooter? Then you need a permit

If your child got a scooter during the holidays the Richardson Police Department (RPD) reminds you that operators of electric or motorized scooters age 12 and older who don't have a valid driver's license must get a City of Richardson Scooter Permit.

To get a permit scooter riders must complete a free scooter safety course sponsored by the RPD. Scooter operators under age 12 are restricted to public sidewalks for riding.

Pocket bikes or mini motorbikes cannot be legally operated on public roadways or sidewalks in the State of Texas.

Scooter safety classes last from 45 to 60 minutes and are every Wednesday at 4 p.m. There is also a class on the second Saturday of the month at 10 a.m. by appointment only.

Designs presented at Fall HOA meeting accepted for spring construction



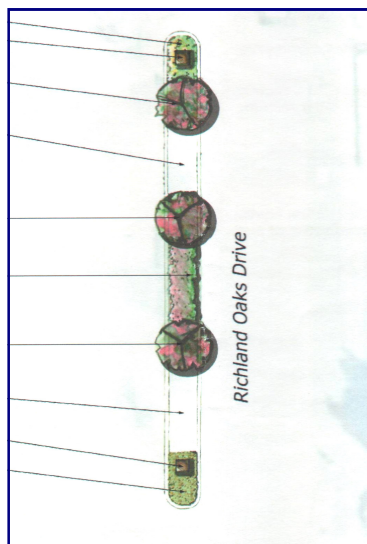
Park Bend at Abrams will have an iron fence with a bronze mark AND a new brick screening wall to match the existing brick wall.

Park Bend Iron Fence Entry



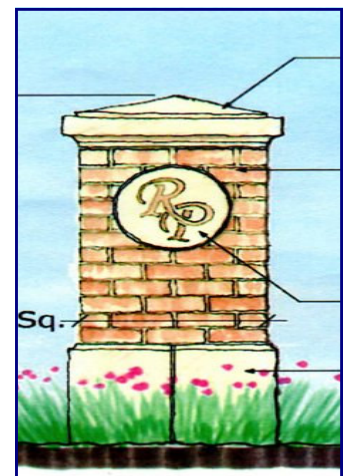
Entry Monument

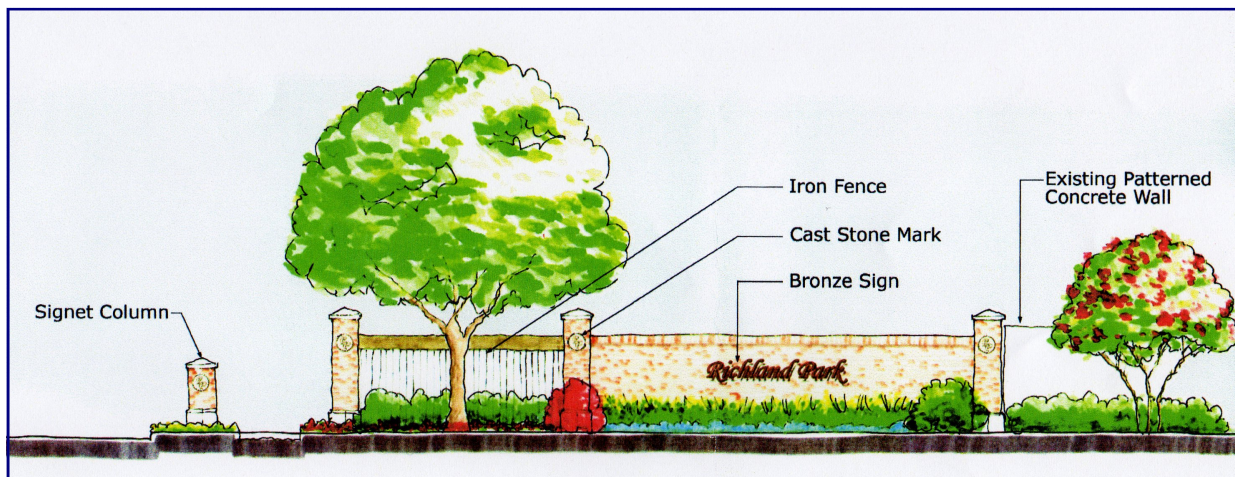
Richland Oaks Drive Center Median Entry

Two Signet Columns and new plantings will frame Richland Oaks Drive.



Signet Column

Five foot, four- inch Signet Columns will be placed at the Audelia entrances of Wentworth, Stillmeadow and Tiffany Trail. They'll be of earth-tone brick similar to existing flagstone with a cast stone Mark inset and base.



This is a rendering of how the Audelia entrances will look at Wentworth, Stillmeadow and Tiffany Trail. A matching Signet Column will be installed on the opposite side of the street at each of these entrances.

Coalition reports latest COR activities

Below is a recent report from Richardson Coalition, part of Richardson Residents for Responsive Government, a PAC comprised of residents who economic progress while preserving quality of life and values.

Community Revitalization Awards for 2008 were announced at the February 2009 Homeowners' Presidents' Meeting. To be eligible to receive tax rebates for improvements to a property, the owner must have completed at least \$20,000 worth of improvements.

The five residential awards went to:

- Hammel residence, 1093 Edith Circle
- Novak residence, 431 Fall Creek Drive
- Stegich residence, 6 Round Rock Circle
- McKeen residence, 402 Canyon Creek Drive
- Johnson residence, 104 North Gentle Drive

The five non-residential awards went to:

- Richardson Heights Shopping Center
- Richardson Village Shopping Center
(1400 block of East Belt Line Road)
- Dal-Rich Shopping Center
- Breckinridge Montessori School

DART Leadership—Richardson was asked to showcase the Spring Creek DART station design at the International Economic Development Council Leadership Summit. Almost every month Richardson has representatives from other communities coming to see what we are doing with the DART rail system.

Richardson's Neighborhood Vitality Program has 13 projects underway. The \$8.1 million provided by the combined bond programs of 1997 and 2006 fund this effort.

Apartment Excellence Program—City staff recently briefed City Council on the progress in developing an Apartment Program Excellence Award Initiative to recognize apartments within Richardson. The program will involve quarterly apartment managers' meetings and annual awards.

Apartment Standards—the 16-unit La Salle Apartments is the third complex to be warned by the Buildings Standards Commission of problems with its structures. Corrective action is required by March 23. The complex is behind (to the east of) the China Town Shopping Center on Greenville Ave.

HOV Access—Access to US 75 HOV lanes from Richardson was incorrectly reported in a recent newspaper article. The City is still working with the Texas Department of Transportation (TX DOT) to obtain Richardson access to and from the HOV lanes as well as other issues involving the expressway.

Sales Tax revenue through February is up 11% because of good sales during December. This is in contrast to a 5% to 15% drop in other cities. In the first four months of the budget year, sales tax income is up \$135,000 or 2%.

The North Texas Municipal Water District has purchased a long, large sewer line from Richardson for \$1.47 million. The line extends from Renner/US 75 to just south of Jupiter/Lookout. It was installed to meet Richardson's needs long ago but then became a regional use line.

Discounts for trash collection now available

If you are age 65 or older you are eligible for a discount on your residential trash collection.

The city requires that the person signing up for the exemption be the one whose name is on the city's water account. However, in the instance of a married couple, either party may fill out the form.

To qualify you need to complete an application form in the Water and Sewer Customer Service Office, Room 101, Richardson City Hall. You should bring one form of identification with you—a valid Texas driver's license, a Texas ID, a birth certificate, a U.S. passport, military discharge papers, printouts from the Social Security Administration or baptismal papers will be accepted as proof of age.

With the discount you'll pay \$13.33. Regular fee is \$18.

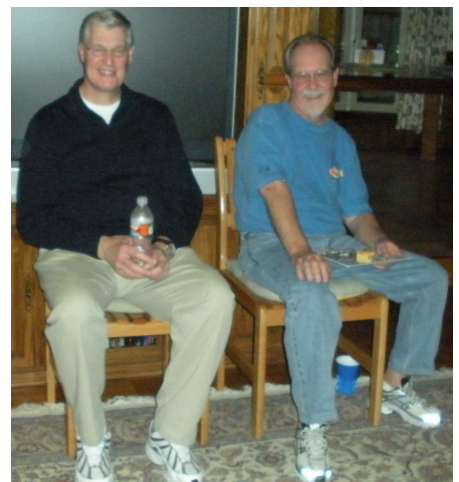
