PHONE FRAUD A NEW SCAM

Below is yet another, in a long list of scams, that criminals are using to bilk the elderly out of thousands of dollars. The Richardson Police Department requested that the following information be passed along to our readers.

"Resident X (name withheld for privacy) advised around 10:00 a.m. on 06-04-2013, he received a phone call from a male claiming to be his grandson. The male said he was involved in an accident and he needed some money. He also claimed he was in Manila, Philippines. He initially asked for \$2,400.00, which Resident X sent via Western Union. Then the male called back claiming he could not leave the country unless all debts are paid. He said he needed an additional \$2500.00 to pay for the car repairs, which Resident X also sent via Western Union.

On 06-05-2013, Resident X received another call from the male, this time stating he needed another \$2,400.00 for the labor costs. Resident X again wired the money and when "his grandson" called again, he asked the male to tell him the name of his brother, Resident X's other grandson. The male answered incorrectly and that is when Resident X realized he had been scammed out of \$7,300.00.

Having a garage sale this summer? Remember you now have to have a city permit for garage sales. They are free but you still have to have one. You can get them online on the city website, print it off and tape it to the front of your house. You can have three a year, no longer than 72 hours each. For more info check the city website at www.cor.gov. (Be sure and check out the crime prevention tips for garage sales on page 5.)

Do you travel and leave your car at the airport? Be sure and take everything out of the glove box that has your address on it. Should the crooks break into your car they can't rob your home. They know you're gone so don't give them an opportunity to take everything you have.

Do you have a GPS on your dash? Chances are you have put in your work address, stores, offices, and other places you frequent. Did you also put in your HOME address? If you did, take it out and title it something else. That way if someone takes your GPS, or if it is built into the dash on your car, the crooks won't know where you live. Everyday these items are stolen just to follow the directions to someone's home because they know you are not there.

Crime Prevention Tips for Garage Sales

- Obtain a City of Richardson Garage Sale Permit at <u>www.cor.net</u> from the Community Services, Code Enforcement link.
- Have two or more people working the sale. Be aware that criminals may work in teams in an attempt to distract you or overwhelm you with customers, to commit a crime.
- Keep your cellphone with you at all times for emergencies. Remember to use your camera phone to capture license plates or suspect information if needed.
- Place smaller, more expensive items next to your checkout table.
- Place large items around the perimeter of the sale so that you can easily see the sale area and there are no concealment opportunities.
- Have a discussion with your family, including children about vehicle safety due to increased traffic around the neighborhood.
- Communicate to your neighbors that you will be having a sale. Encourage neighbors to close their garage doors to reduce the chance of a criminal taking advantage of an open door opportunity. Also remind them to report suspicious activity to 911.
- Watch for customers blocking alleys
 with their vehicles, post signs asking
 visitors to not block the alley or drive ways. Politely remind them or contact
 police for assistance. Blocking an alley is
 a safety concern for first responders in
 the event of an emergency.
- Cover items or remove them from your garage if they are valuable or not for sale. It's better to hold your sale outside of the garage to keep strangers from entering your home or having access to an interior door.
- Keep pets secure.

- Never leave your sale unattended.
- Consider purchasing a counterfeit bill detector pen from an office supply store.
- Keep a minimal amount of cash on hand. Avoid having a cashbox visible and never make change with a customer next to you so they can see the amount of cash you have collected. Only keep enough change for \$20.00. For larger transactions consider telling the person you will hold the item until they can return with the correct amount. Take large bills or collected amounts of money to a secure location inside your home while another person attends your sale. Avoid taking personal checks.



- Avoid talking with customers about personal information or questions about your schedule, living situation, or what's in your house.
- Keep doors and windows locked during your sale, do not let people use your house for any reason, including trying on clothes, testing a small appliance to see if it works, using the bathroom.
- Keep gates locked that lead into your backyard.
- Good customer services is also a great crime prevention technique, greet all customers, so they know they have been seen.
- Take down your signs around the neighborhood after the sale.

Tips on Protecting Yourself

HOW TO PREPARE BEFORE A TORNADO

- To begin preparing, you should build an emergency kit and make a family communications plan.
- Listen to NOAA Weather Radio or to commercial radio or television newscasts for the latest information. In any emergency, always listen to the instructions given by local emergency management officials.
- Be alert to changing weather conditions.
- Look for approaching storms.
- Look for the following danger signs:
 - Dark, often greenish sky
 - Large hail
 - A large, dark, low-lying cloud (particularly if rotating)
 - Loud roar, similar to a freight train
 - If you see approaching storms or any of the danger signs, be prepared to take shelter immediately

IF YOU ARE IN A STRUCTURE,

(e.g. residence, small building, school, nursing home, hospital, factory, shopping center, high-rise building), **THEN** go to a predesignated shelter area such as a safe room, basement, storm cellar, or the lowest building level. If there is no basement, go to the center of an interior room on the lowest level (closet, interior hallway) away from corners, windows, doors, and outside walls. Put as many walls as possible between you and the outside. Get under a sturdy table and use your arms to protect your head and neck. In a high-rise building, go to a small interior room or hallway on the lowest floor possible. Put on sturdy shoes and do not open windows.

IF YOU ARE OUTSIDE WITH NO

SHELTER, immediately get into a vehicle, buckle your seat belt and try to drive to the closest sturdy shelter. If your vehicle is hit by flying debris while you are driving, pull over and park. Stay in the car with the seat belt on. Put your head down below the windows; cover your head with your hands and a blan-



ket, coat or other cushion if possible. If you can safely get noticeably lower than the level of the roadway, leave your car and lie in that area, covering your head with your hands. Do not get under an overpass or bridge. You are safer in a low, flat location. Never try to outrun a tornado in urban or congested areas in a car or truck. Instead, leave the vehicle immediately for safe shelter. Watch out for flying debris. Flying debris from tornadoes causes most fatalities and injuries.

WHAT TO DO AFTER A TORNADO

Injury may result from the direct impact of a tornado or it may occur afterward when people walk among debris and enter damaged buildings. A study of injuries after a tornado in Marion, Illinois, showed that 50 percent of the tornado-related injuries were suffered during rescue attempts, cleanup and other post-tornado activities. Nearly a third of the injuries resulted from stepping on nails. Because tornadoes often damage power lines, gas lines or electrical systems, there is a risk of fire, electrocution or an explosion. Protecting yourself and your family requires promptly treating any injuries suffered during the storm and using extreme care to avoid further hazards.

INJURIES

Check for injuries. Do not attempt to move seriously injured people unless they are in immediate danger of further injury. Get medical assistance immediately. If someone has

stopped breathing, begin CPR if you are trained to do so. Stop a bleeding injury by applying direct pressure to the wound. Have any puncture wound evaluated by a physician. If you are trapped, try to attract attention to your location.

INSPECTING THE DAMAGE

- After a tornado, be aware of possible structural, electrical or gas-leak hazards in your home. Contact your local city or county building inspectors for information on structural safety codes and standards. They may also offer suggestions on finding a qualified contractor to do work for you.
- In general, if you suspect any damage to your home, shut off electrical power, natural gas and propane tanks to avoid fire, electrocution or explosions.
- If it is dark when you are inspecting your home, use a flashlight rather than a candle or torch to avoid the risk of fire or explosion in a damaged home.
- If you see frayed wiring or sparks, or if there is an odor of something burning, you should immediately shut off the electrical system at the main circuit breaker if you have not done so already.
- If you smell gas or suspect a leak, turn off the main gas valve, open all windows and leave the house immediately. Notify the gas company, the police or fire departments, or State Fire Marshal's office and do not turn on the lights, light matches, smoke or do anything that could cause a spark. Do not return to your house until you are told it is safe to do so.

SAFETY DURING CLEAN UP

- Wear sturdy shoes or boots, long sleeves and gloves.
- Learn proper safety procedures and operating instructions before operating any gaspowered or electric-powered saws or tools.
- Clean up spilled medicines, drugs, flammable liquids and other hazardous materials.

GENERAL SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

Here are some safety precautions that could help you avoid injury after a tornado:

- Continue to monitor your battery-powered radio or television for emergency information.
- Be careful when entering any structure that has been damaged.
- Wear sturdy shoes or boots, long sleeves and gloves when handling or walking on or near debris.
- Be aware of hazards from exposed nails and broken glass.
- Do not touch downed power lines or objects in contact with downed lines. Report electrical hazards to the police and the utility company.
- Use battery-powered lanterns, if possible, rather than candles to light homes without electrical power. If you use candles, make sure they are in safe holders away from curtains, paper, wood or other flammable items. Never leave a candle burning when you are out of the room.
- Never use generators, pressure washers, grills, camp stoves or other gasoline, propane, natural gas or charcoal-burning devices inside your home, basement, garage or camper or even outside near an open window, door or vent. Carbon monoxide (CO) an odorless, colorless gas that can cause sudden illness and death if you breathe it from these sources can build up in your home, garage or camper and poison the people and animals inside. Seek prompt medical attention if you suspect CO poisoning and are feeling dizzy, lightheaded or nauseated.
- Hang up displaced telephone receivers that may have been knocked off by the tornado, but stay off the telephone, except to report an emergency.
- Cooperate fully with public safety officials.
- Respond to requests for volunteer assistance by police, fire fighters, emergency management and relief organizations, but do not go into damaged areas unless assistance has been requested. Your presence could hamper relief efforts and you could endanger yourself.

8 DANGER ZONES THAT COULD THREATEN YOUR HOME

Tornadoes, hurricanes, and floods grab all the headlines, but your home is way more vulnerable to house fires (which occur in the U.S. every 82 seconds) and water damage. Of course, if you live in a hurricane, flood, or tornado prone area, do take special precautions. But here are 8 areas everyone should look at to avoid serious damage from fire and water.

1. GUTTERS.



Clogged gutters can cause major water damage when they overflow, letting water pool around the foundation.

2. WASHING MACHINE.

A burst inlet hose will send water gushing into your laundry room. Use braided steel hoses, instead of rubber ones, and inspect regularly for leaks and loose connections.

3. GAS GRILL.

Fires can start from a leaky gas supply hose, or if a grill is placed in an enclosed porch or too close to the home's siding. Check the supply



hose regularly for cracks and replace when worn. Locate your grill at least 10 feet away from the house in an area with no overhead obstructions.

4. WIRING.

Fires can start when bad wires short out. Symptoms include: frequent blowing of fuses or tripping of circuit breakers; flickering lights; and a tingling feeling when you touch a wall switch or appliance. Think about replacing wiring more than 40 years old. Take out old fuses and circuit breakers and install arc-fault circuit interrupters that cut off the electricity when there's trouble.

5. COOKTOP.

Around 40% of home fires start in the kitchen and cooktops are the number one cause.



Don't leave burners unattended when on and store anything that can burn, such as pot holders and paper towels, a good distance away.

6. FIREPLACE.



Most chimney fires are caused by creosote buildup, so have your chimney swept once a year. Sparks can also

fly beyond the hearth and ignite furniture or rugs, so always keep the screen closed when using your fireplace.

7. DRYER.

Lint can build up inside the cabinet and create a fire hazard near the heating element. Every few months, brush out or vacuum any buildup around the lint filter. Hire a pro to clean out the cabinet every other year.

8. SMOKE DETECTORS.

At least once a year, change the batteries and replace units more than 10 years old.

Stage 3 Water Restrictions

The City of Richardson has implemented its Stage 3 water restriction measures effective June 1. The implementation of Stage 3 comes at the request of the North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD), which is facing critical shortages in its water supply.

Irrigation Schedule

Lawn irrigation is permitted once a week under Stage 3 water restrictions.

Additional restrictions

- No outdoor watering is allowed between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. or during periods of precipitation (rain, snow, sleet, etc.).
- Excessive water runoff from any landscaped area onto any impervious surfaces is prohibited.

Exemptions

- Use of drip irrigation systems and soaker hoses to protect foundations is allowed. Recommended maximum 2 hours when needed and not during periods of precipitation.
- Hand watering of ornamental flower beds and other ornamental landscaping is allowed; hand watering of lawns is prohibited.
- Variances are available for watering of existing newly installed landscaping until vegetative roots are established. Any variance approved for watering new landscaping will

- expire 30 days after becoming effective.
- Public athletic fields may be watered up to twice a week.
- The operation of ornamental fountains is permitted.
- Washing of vehicles, boats, trailers, etc. is permitted.
- Newly constructed swimming pools, Jacuzzis and spas may be filled.
- Pools may be drained and refilled for repairs as needed (must follow proper water disposal methods).
- Existing swimming pools, Jacuzzis, and spas may be replenished to maintain operational levels.
- Commercial full-service or selfservice car wash facilities, including those at service stations and automobile dealership facilities is permitted.
- Washing or hosing down of sidewalks, driveways, patios, porches, parking areas or other similar paved surfaces is permitted.
- Activities utilizing other sources of water (wastewater, effluent, natural water springs, ponds or deep water wells) are permitted.
- Golf courses may water greens and tee boxes as needed.
- Smart irrigation and drip irrigation systems, provided irrigation does not occur more than once every seven days.
- Hydroseeding, hydromulching and sprigging is permitted.

NEED FOR STAGE 3 RESTRICTIONS

The North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) Board of Directors voted to implement Stage 3 of the NTMWD Water Conservation and Drought Contingency and Water Emergency Response Plan on April 25, 2013. The board vote was prompted by the adverse impact on the NTMWD's raw water supplies due to below average rainfall and the loss of 28 percent of NTMWD's total raw water supply from Lake Texoma.

"Our primary water supplies are below normal levels due to less than average rainfall, and projections indicate we will not get the rainfall we need going into this summer," said Jim Parks, Executive Director of NTMWD. "We need to conserve the supplies we have and reduce our water use by at least 10 percent," Parks added.

Both Lavon Lake and Chapman Lake, two key NTMWD reservoirs, are down almost eight feet below normal conservation levels. In addition, the district still cannot draw water from Lake Texoma because of a zebra mussel infestation.

Construction continues on a pipeline from Lake Texoma to the NTMWD water treatment plant in Wylie that will allow the district to resume pumping water from Texoma. However, the first phase of that project will not be completed until January 2014.

Stage 3 restrictions will remain in effect until further notice, however, the NTMWD Board of Directors could reconsider Stage 3 conservation measures if weather patterns change and the Lavon Lake watershed receives significant rainfall.

RESIDENTIAL CODE ENFORCEMENT

The Residential Inspection Program was established to compliment residents' efforts to maintain neighborhood desirability and encourage reinvestment. By working together we can keep Richardson an attractive, healthy, and safe place to live! Over the years, minimum property maintenance standards have been established to help realize this goal. Below are some of the issues our code enforcement staff address on a daily basis:

Address Numbers

To enable the Police and Fire Departments to respond quickly to emergency calls, address numbers must be posted so that they are clearly visible from the street and alley. Numbers must be posted on the curb or curbside mailbox and on the front and back of a residence on the home, garage, fence, or other structure between 3 and 10 feet off the ground. Address numbers must be a minimum of 3 inches high so that they are easily seen.

High Grass and Weeds

Residents are responsible for maintaining the grass and weeds at their property, including all adjacent parkways and alley easements. Grass and weeds are in violation when they reach a height of 12 inches.

Vegetation

Trees, bushes and other vegetation must be kept trimmed 7 feet above sidewalks, 14 feet above streets and alleys, and 1 foot back from the alley pavement. All vegetation should also be kept trimmed so that it does not obstruct the view of motorists or pedestrians using public streets and alleys.

Fences

Residents are responsible for maintaining the fence around their property. Fences should be maintained so that they do not lean severely and are not missing slats or sections. New fences or significant replacement of existing fences require a permit. Call the Building Inspection Department at 972-744-4180 for more information.

Open Storage

Open storage is defined as the placement of an item that is not customarily used or stored outside, or that is made of a material that is not weather resistant in an unenclosed outdoor area for more than 24 continuous hours. Open storage is prohibited in the front yard, on a front porch, under a carport, or any other unenclosed area. All items stored outdoors must be screened from adjacent properties, streets and alleys by a 6-foot, solid wooden fence. Outside storage is limited to one percent of a residential lot.

Trash and Debris

Residents are responsible for ensuring their property, including all adjacent parkways and alley easements, is free of litter and debris. This includes not placing trash out for collection on non-collection days. To ensure timely collection, trash should be placed out before 7:00 am on collection days only.

Brush And Bulky Item Collection

Brush and Bulky Item Collection (BABIC) is a free service offered to Richardson residents. The service is designed to help residents dispose of large amounts of brush and oversized items like unwanted appliances and furniture that cannot be placed out for regular trash collection. Residents must request BABIC service prior to placing an item on the parkway for collection. Requests for brush or bulky item collection service can be made 24-hours a day, 7-days a week by leaving a voice-mail message at (972) 744-4111 or by completing an on-line request form. If you wish to dispose of (rather than recycle) small bundles of branches, they should be cut to 3-foot lengths and placed out for regular trash collection.

Minimum Property Standards

Residents are responsible for maintaining homes and businesses by keeping the exterior (brick, wood, siding, roof, windows, doors, etc.) free of holes and other defects. All wood surfaces must be painted and in good condition.

Home Occupations/Garage Sales

Home businesses are permitted in Richardson so long as they are incidental to the primary use of the premises. If you want to operate a business from your home, please contact Community Services to ensure your business does not violate the home occupation ordinance. A residence may conduct up to three garage sales per year. Each sale may last no longer than three consecutive days.

Yard Parking

Residents may not park vehicles on grass between a front building wall and the street, or between a side building wall and the street on corner lots. In addition, vehicles may not be parked on vacant or unimproved lots.




