

## **CRIME WATCH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED**

The Richland Park/Oaks Crime Watch needs more volunteers to help patrol our neighborhood. We have fairly good coverage during the daytime, but are in need of help for nighttime. Unfortunately, late night is when we experience most of our problems. Therefore, we need more volunteers at night, every day of the week. This is a great way to get out, meet new people, learn new things and experience something different in life.

In order to join the Crime Watch Patrol, you will need to fill out an *application form* which we submit to the Richardson Police Department. The police will run a criminal background check on each applicant. Once all the paperwork has been cleared, the applicant will receive about six hours of training. All new applicants will also be assigned a patrol partner.

Crime Watch Patrols are extremely effective because criminals do not want to get caught by anyone, police or otherwise. So when you put those reflective signs on your cars and patrol the neighborhood, the bad guys tend to go some place else. The problem is we need to maintain these patrols at all hours in order to keep crime away.

Each shift usually consists of one and half hours of patrol time every other week (total of 3 hours per month.) The two shifts where we need the most help are evenings (7 p.m. to midnight) and deep nights (midnight to 6:00 a.m.).


# **REFRESHING RICHLAND PARK AND OAKS** WALNUT STREET ENTRANCES




Landscaping, as anyone who has done any recently knows, can be very expensive to do if you do it right. We will do as much as funds will allow from

membership revenue. The more neighbors who join the association the more we can do. We would also like to refresh the Audelia entrances along with the Lois Lane entrance off of Walnut.


The RNA board is working very hard to make this an even greater neighborhood. A big thank you goes to Michael Bahr for all of the work he has done working with the city to come up with a great plan.

# **Chlorine maintenance begins March 4**

The North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) is conducting its annual chlorine maintenance in its water treatchange is necessary to maintain the regional system and year round water quality.

The maintenance is a critical part of the water treatment process that keeps drinking water free of harmful microorganisms, such as parasites and viruses. Normally, a two-step process first treats the water at the treatment plant and then chloramine disinfectant (chlorine + ammonia) is added to maintain water quality on its journey through the miles of pipes to homes and husinesses

During the maintenance period, temporary conversion is a common practice. During the maintenance period, the cit-

NTMWD suspends adding ammonia and uses only chlorine to keep water disinfected ment process March 4-April 1. The routine as it travels through pipes. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, this ies and districts served by NTMWD may help move the chlorine-disinfected water through the system by flushing water from fire hydrants. The combination of converting to chlorine disinfectant and flushing the pipes helps maintain the system.

The maintenance does not increase the amount of chlorine or affect the water quality and the water remains safe for use. Con-

There are simple steps to minimize taste, odor or skin sensitivities, including placing a pitcher of water in the refrigerator overnight or adding a slice of citrus to the water. Adding a crushed 1,000 mg vitamin C tablet to bath water will remove the chlorine.

Fix a Leak Week is a great time for residents to check for water leaks and drips inside the home. Did you know that a toilet leak can waste more than 200 gallons of water a day and is one of the largest water wasters in a home? Although you can usually hear a running toilet, some toilet leaks are silent.



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
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


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
