CRIME WATCH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Richland Park/Oaks Crime Watch needs more volunteers to help patrol our neighborhood. We have fairly good coverage during the daytime, but are in need of help for nighttime. Unfortunately, late night is when we experience most of our problems. Therefore, we need more volunteers at night, every day of the week. This is a great way to get out, meet new people, learn new things and experience something different in life.

In order to join the Crime Watch Patrol, you will need to fill out an *application form* which we submit to the Richardson Police Department. The police will run a criminal background check on each applicant. Once all the paperwork has been cleared, the applicant will receive about six hours of training. All new applicants will also be assigned a patrol partner.

Crime Watch Patrols are extremely effective because criminals do not want to get caught by anyone, police or otherwise. So when you put those reflective signs on your cars and patrol the neighborhood, the bad guys tend to go some place else. The problem is we need to maintain these patrols at all hours in order to keep crime away.

Each shift usually consists of one and half hours of patrol time every other week (total of 3 hours per month.) The two shifts where we need the most help are evenings (7 p.m. to midnight) and deep nights (midnight to 6:00 a.m.).

HOME IMPROVEMENT INCENTIVE PROGRAM

The City of Richardson is proud to offer the Home Improvement Incentive Program. This unique and innovative program is designed to provide an economic incentive to homeowners who substantially reinvest in their home. The purpose of the program is to:

- Encourage reinvestment in residential neighborhoods
- Help distinguish Richardson from surrounding communities by providing an economic incentive to prospective buvers
- Positively affect the value of the City's housing stock
- Lower the financial hurdle for homeowners to make significant improvements to their homes
- Demonstrate a strong commitment by the City to reinvest in residential neighborhoods

ELIGIBILITY

All homeowners in single-family zoned areas are eligible to participate, except those who are delinquent in taxes or other fees.

To qualify, an improvement project involving the reconstruction or remodeling of a single family home must cost at least \$20,000 and be completed within 24 months of project approval.

To participate, a homeowner will be required to submit an application to the Community Services Department prior to construction beginning, provide a cost estimate for the improvement project, consent to periodic inspections during construction and verify final construction costs.

If an application is approved, the homeowner will be required to execute an economic development agreement with the city prepared and approved by the city attorney.

INCENTIVE PAYMENT

A one-time incentive equal to 10 times the amount of the increase in city taxes will be paid to the homeowner based on the property's pre-construction and post-construction appraised value. The appraisal district will determine the property's certified value.

The incentive will be paid to the homeowner pursuant to the economic development agreement on April 1 of the first full calendar year subsequent to completion of the approved project.



EXAMPLE

Assume that a home improvement project commences in January 2016 and is completed in June 2016. Further assume that the 2017 property taxes increase \$300 above the 2016 property taxes as a result of the increase in the taxable value of the improvements. The total incentive would be \$3,000 and would be paid on April 1, 2018.

Note: Your incentive payment may result in federal income tax consequences.

You should consult your own tax advisor. All or a portion of *your incentive payment may constitute taxable income regardless* of whether you receive a Form 1099-MISC from the City. If the amount of your incentive payment is \$600 or more, you may receive Internal Revenue Service Form 1099-MISC from the City. To apply for the Home Improvement Incentive Program go to www.cor.gov and download the HIIP Application.

BRUSH AND BULKY ITEM COLLECTION

Have you recently trimmed your trees? Are you considering replacing appliances or worn out furniture? Before you set these items outside, there are a couple of things you should know. To help residents dispose of brush and large bulky items, the City offers several waste disposal options including Brush and Bulky Item Collection or BABIC. BABIC is designed to assist residents with the disposal of large amounts of brush or other large bulky items.

Although BABIC is a free service, a homeowner or resident must request collection prior to placing an item on the parkway for collection. Requests for collection service can be made 24-hours a day, 7 days a week by leaving a voice-mail message at (972) 744-4111 or completing an on-line request at www.cor.net.

BABIC GUIDELINES

- 1. Your BABIC pickup is Monday.
- 2. Request for a BABIC pick up must be made by 12:00 midnight the night before your designated pick-up day.
- 3. The items to be collected are out by 7:00 am the morning of collection.
- 4. Bricks, concrete, and dirt CANNOT be picked up – these items must be taken to: 121 Regional Disposal Facility, 3820 Sam Rayburn Highway, Melissa, TX 75454, (972) 295-6380, Monday -Friday: 8:00 am – 5:00 pm, Saturday: 8:00 am – 3:00 pm.
- 5. Hazardous Waste, such as, paints, oil, chemicals, pesticides, etc. CANNOT be collected and must be taken to the Home Chemical Collection Center located at: 11234 Plano Road, Dallas, TX 75243, (214) 553-1765, Tuesdays: 9:00 am - 7:30 pm, Wednesdays and Thursdays: 8:30 am - 5:00 pm, 2nd and 4th Saturdays of each month: 9:00 am -3:00 pm.

This year on October 4, 2016 during *National Night Out*, we want to put an extra effort into the canned goods drive. So, the Richland Homeowners Association (RHA) has decided to hand out T-shirts for canned goods donations. Here are some guidelines for food donations and a list of most needed items according to the COR website. We hope to see everyone Tuesday, October 4, 2016 at Richland Park from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

DONATION GUIDELINES :

- Items that are past the expiration date cannot be distributed and must be discarded
- Even though home canned goods are tastier, we have no way of knowing how they were processed and when they were processed therefore they are discarded.
- Items that have been opened and partially used. We are unable to distribute these items so they are discarded. Most often this occurs with spices, condiments, cereal, rice, pasta, tea etc.
- Items that contain any alcohol must be discarded, including Vodka Sauce, Red Wine Vinegar, etc.
- All donated items that are severely dented or damaged cannot be distributed and must be discarded.
- Over the counter medicines cannot be distributed and must be discarded.
- As much as we appreciate jars of baby food and formula, we often have to discard this since the majority of our clients qualify for *Women, Infants and Children* (WIC).

ore folks in our neighborhood have been considering purchasing security cameras for their homes, but are wondering where to start and what to get. Our neighbor Ronnie Brock shared some helpful information about his purchase.

The unit itself is a Winbook system bought at the Microcenter on Central Expressway by the Wal-mart. It comes with four cameras, four 60-foot cables and the DVR for \$99. It allows eight cameras to be connected to the system. You have to purchase the hard drive separately; I bought the Toshiba 1 terabyte for \$39.99. The extra cameras are \$19.99 for the 700 line, and the 600 line cameras, which are better clarity with night vision, are \$29.99. It has an app that allows for viewing the system remotely which is downloadable for both Android and iPhone. It connects through the home internet, and can easily be installed by the average homeowner. If anyone would like to view the system before buying it, they are free to contact me. Also the 1 terabyte hard drive stores well over a week's footage if it is set up to record on motion activation. Mine captures a lot of motion because it is catching both the alley and the entrance of Birch Lane in both directions coming from Abrams. So for a total of \$200, I installed a seven camera set-up that gets two views of the front yard, two views of the driveway and mailbox, and two views of the back yard plus a camera inside for extra security.

REASONS TO HOLD A BLOCK PARTY

- To meet your neighbors. The more you know who belongs to the neighborhood, the more likely you are to identify strangers or suspicious people.
- To increase the sense of belonging in your neighborhood.
- To make connections within the community.
- To meet some of the long time residents in the neighborhood.

GOOD IDEAS TO CONSIDER

- Invite City Council members, school officials or Neighborhood Services staff member.
- Call the Police Department, Fire Department, Health Services, or other City department to
- obtain literature, give-aways, or to request a presentation.
- Make sure you record the name and contact information for everyone who attends and everyone you contacted; after all, the idea of a block party is to connect neighbors.
- Plan lots of activities for • children.
- Include activities that encourage people to meet each other. Use name tags and include children by asking them to create the tags. Have a block/street clean up as
- part of the party.

STEPS FOR ORGANIZING A BLOCK PARTY

- Gather neighbors and divide up the tasks. Your block party will be much more successful if you involve others in planning the event.
- Go door to door. Start knocking on doors to find out if there is enough interest and, if so, which day would be the best for most people.
- *Pick a date and time* (mid-afternoon to evening works best). Try to pick a date 4-6 weeks in advance to allow plenty of time for planning and notifying neighbors.
- **Decide on a location.** Where you have your party depends on where you live. Look around and evaluate your area. Cul-de-sacs and road ends the best places for hosting a Block Party. What if you can't have a Block Party on your street? No problem! Many sports fields are surrounded by non-playing areas that are free for you to use. There are many neighborhood parks built for your enjoyment-use them!
- **Obtain a Special Activity Authorization form and Block Party** Petition from the Traffic/Transportation Department by calling 972-744-4333. If you plan on closing off the street with barricades you must fill out the request form and collect your neighbor's signatures.
- *Make Decisions about the food.* Food is a must for a block party. If you want to have a good party, you've got to have food. Suggest a pot luck or have everyone chip in for catering.
- Decide on Activities. To spice up your party, you may want to include some games and activities for both children and adults. Often block parties are held at the end of a block cleanup, a block garage sale, or a day of tree-planting; others have a theme such as Fourth of July or celebrating a neighborhood anniversary.
- Go door to door to hand out invitations. Going door-to-door with invitations adds a personal touch that will help you get more people interested in volunteering for and attending the event.
- *Keep the invitation simple* and remember to include contact names and phone numbers for R.S.V.P.'s.

Tf you haven't thought about your home's curb appeal, or if Lit's been a while since you've considered it, walk or drive past your home and look at it from the street with a critical, impartial eye. Ask yourself, "What would a stranger notice first about my home?" Would they see an inviting and well-kept exterior, or would they immediately notice some delayed maintenance and room for improvement? A home's curb appeal can be critical from a real estate and value perspective.

Whether your house is on the real estate market or you'd just like for the exterior to be more attractive from the street, there are some simple outside DIY projects that you can do to increase your home's curb appeal:

PAINT THE FRONT DOOR. A fresh coat of paint or stain on the main door can do a lot to make your home's entrance look clean and inviting. Consider a bright paint color that contrasts well with your home's exterior wall and trim color. Shades of red, blue,

and yellow are popular colors that can make your front entrance "pop." Or, if your home has a more traditional, classic design, consider a glossy black paint. Either way, you can't go wrong.

DECORATE WITH A WREATH.

Give your guests a special welcome at the front door with a friendly wreath or basket. Wreaths can be seasonal, or you can choose one that will be appropriate all year around. If you don't want to put a nail in the door, look for a wreath hook hanger at your local home or crafts store.

REPLACE YOUR MAILBOX. Tired

of the same old mailbox? Get a new one or spruce up the one you have with a fresh coat of paint or some new numbers. Plant some blooming flowers or shrubbery at the base of the mailbox to add some color and interest.

SPRUCE UP THE FRONT LAWN.

You can never go wrong with clean landscaping in the front

> yard. Focus your efforts around the walkway and front door for maximum impact. Think about creating curved garden areas rather than straight lines for visual interest. Be sure to intersperse some evergreen plants for color and texture during all seasons of the year.

PLAY WITH FLORALS. Flowers can light up any space. Add some blooming container plants to anchor plants to anchor the front entrance or walkway areas. Be sure to coordinate the colors with the rest of your garden, and remember that containers usually need more water than bedding plants because they dry out more quickly.

GARDEN WITH WINDOW BOXES.

Window boxes are a simple and seamless way to add color and charm to your home. For visual appeal, be sure to plant some trailing plants as well as a variety of colors and textures in the boxes.

CONSIDER SHUTTERS FOR YOUR WINDOWS. If your front windows don't have shutters, consider adding some that complement your home's style. Paint or stain the shutters to match or to contrast well with the exterior wall, trim, and door color. Visit your local home or lumber store to see styles and material options.

INSTALL NEW OUTDOOR LIGHTING. Exterior light fixtures can add to or detract from your home's curb appeal. If your exterior light fixtures are old, damaged, or dated, consider enhancing your yard with outdoor lighting. Make sure the type of light fixtures you choose are in keeping with your home's architecture and scale. If you don't want to purchase new ones, consider cleaning and painting the ones you have. You can also add landscape lighting to enhance your home's evening curb appeal.



REVAMP YOUR PATIO. If your home has one, fix up your front porch or patio with some planters, outdoor furniture, and maybe even a relaxing porch swing. In addition to making the exterior of your house more attractive, you'll gain an outdoor living space for your family to enjoy.

One of the best things you can do for your home's curb appeal is to keep the exterior clean and maintained. Fix any sagging or loose gutters, cracked windows, or damaged wood. Mow the grass regularly and remove leaves and debris from the lawn and flower beds. Keep the shrubbery trimmed, and remember to sweep the walk and put up toys and bicycles every night. Don't let your neighbors steal the show. With just a little effort, your home can be appealing and attractive on the outside as well as on the inside.

ARE YOUR ROSES DYING?

They could have the Rose Rosette Virus which seems to be spreading throughout North Texas, including right here at home in Richland Park/Oaks. The symptoms include excessive thorns, malformation of leaves, excessive shoot growth, witches' broom and plant death.

Rose rosette has been documented in the United States since 1941, but only

recently did botanists identify

the pathogen and that it is spread by a tiny, wingless mite. The mites, which are invisible to the human eye, feed on a plant's sap, transmitting the virus to the bush. Roses die within two to three years.

Horticulturists are seeing more cases of it on all the different rose varieties. Part of the problem is there is no cure of Rose Rosette. Once a plant is infected the only thing you can do is remove it and throw it away. It's important to remove infected bushes so that they don't become mite breeding grounds.

Be sure to check with your local nursery or expert first to verify whether your rosebush has Rose Rosette. If it does, you need to remove the infected plant, bag it to trap the mites, and then throw it in the trash. You do not want to send the infected rose bush to be composted.

The good news is that experts say it is a manageable situation that shouldn't stop you from planting roses. Just be sure not to plant your roses too close together. Plant them far enough apart so that mites can't blow from plant to plant. So now you can stop and smell the roses again!

GOOD FENCES MAKE GOOD NEIGHBORS

FENCES are often a feature of our homes that are taken for granted, but serve various purposes for residents and neighborhoods. A well-maintained fence, properly installed, can dramatically alter the appearance of your property



as well as add substantial value and improve "curb appeal." Fences provide privacy, define territory and increase our sense of security.

Richardson homeowners and residents are responsible for the upkeep and condition of the fence around their property. Fences that are leaning at a 20% angle or more in either direction

or that are missing slats or sections are in violation of City code and must be repaired or replaced.

All damaged or missing portions of a fence need to be replaced or repaired with comparable materials that match the remaining portion

of the fence. This does not pertain to new wood fence sections that have not had a chance to age from time and weather.

Fencing materials not allowed in the City include plywood, barbed wire, razor ribbons, sheet metal, corrugated steel, fiberglass panel or electric fences.

Screening fences are required around all swimming pools as well as open storage areas to keep them hidden from public view. Open storage refers to items stored in the front, rear or side yard, carport or unenclosed porch that are not typically found outside and occupy no more than 1% of the lot. Outdoor furniture, planters and children's toys are not considered outside storage.

Fences in your front yard can be no higher than two and a half feet and fences on the side or back of your



property should not exceed 8 feet. A 4-foot or taller fence is required around a pool. Fences are not allowed on corner lots where their placement might obstruct the vision of motorists on the public streets.

If you plan on installing or replacing more than 25 percent of an existing fence, you will need to obtain a building permit. The fee for a permit is \$30. To obtain a permit you will need to contact the Building Inspection Department located at 411 W. Arapaho Road, Room 108, or via phone at 972-744-4180.

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service (https://postalinspectors. uspis.gov) is the federal law enforcement agency that protects the mail system. Contact them to report: MAIL FRAUD – file an online mail fraud complaint

The USPS, its inspector general, and the U.S. Postal Inspection Service handle complaints about service-related issues. If you have a comment or complaint about a major policy change, such as postage rates or a proposed five day delivery schedule, contact the Postal Regulatory Commission (PRC) at <u>www.prc.gov</u> using their online contact form.

MAIL THEFT – use the e-mail form to explain the issue. Under Inquiry Type, select Problem. Under Customer Service, select Support, and Mail Theft. Under Additional Information, explain why your complaint is mail theftrelated.

IDENTITY THEFT – report U.S. Mail-related identity theft via the online identity theft complaint form (http://ehome.uspis.gov/mailtheft/idtheft.aspx).


