

# (TARR) Take All Root Rot

TARR (Take All Root Rot) has emerged as a major destructive disease for St. Augustine grass in Texas. Heavy spring and summer rains in recent years have contributed to the spread of this disease. The development of the disease is encouraged in well maintained lawns by the use of high nitrate nitrogen fertilizers as well as deficiencies of micronutrients in the soil. The causal agent is the fungus Gaeumannomyces graminis var. graminis. The brown-black mass of long branching growth of the fungus colonizes roots, stolons and shoots but it is primarily a root destroying pathogen.

### **SIGNS & SYMPTOMS**

Symptoms of take-all root rot disease (TARR) typically appear on St Augustine grass as diseased patches of turf during late spring and throughout the summer months. Typically this is seen as yellow patches. These yellow patches can persist throughout the summer growing season.

This by itself is not indicative of the disease, as yellowing leaves can also be caused by chinch bug damages, certain nutrient deficiencies, or drought stress. Both TARR and drought stress will cause folding of the blades at mid rib.

As TARR progresses, you will see a thinning of the turf in circular or circular patterned patches one to fifteen feet in diameter. As the infected stolons die, ugly patches of bare ground are left and soon invaded by weeds. The lawn takes on an appearance of a "patchwork" of dead and declining turf. Any grass stolons attempting to grow into

cannot take root TARR can be confused with

these barren areas will fail as they

brown patch as they look similar. The key difference being that with brown patch the leaves are rotted, but the roots are healthy. With TARR, the leaves remain intact while the roots are black, rotted and shriveled. These rotted roots/ stolons can easily be pulled out of the ground. Though grub damage can appear the same, the roots would be completely removed, eaten by the grubs, as opposed to being killed by the TARR fungus and remaining.

TARR is seen more in shaded grass areas than in sunny grass areas.

#### **MANAGEMENT**

- Turf management vs. chemicals will help prevent and contain TARR.
- Fertilizers containing Ammonium (ammonium sulfate, urea, and ammonium chloride) are the preferred nitrogen sources. Fertilizers containing nitrate nitrogen (ammonium nitrate and calcium

nitrate) seem to contribute to an increase in the severity of fungal diseases and should be avoided.

- TARR has also been linked to a deficiency of manganese available in the soil. Ammonium nitrogen and / or chloride contain fertilizers will increase the amount of manganese in that is available to the plant.
- Raise the blades on your mower in the summer when the turf is already under drought stress. More leaf area supports the root system.
- Manage your irrigation system, run it while you are available to make sure areas are not being over watered and the water is being absorbed not running off.

Follow this procedure to prevent the spread of the disease:

- 1. **Rake out** all of the dead grass in the infected area and dispose of.
- 2. Spread Canadian Sphagnum **Peat Moss** over the infected area. One bale will cover approximately 1000 sq. ft. at 1/2" - 1".
- 3. *Water* the peat moss well to get it wetted and keep it moist.
- 4. *Spray Consan* **20** (Triple action ammonium chloride) over the entire lawn; mix 2 tsp - 1 Tbsp /gal of water, covers 250-500 sq. ft. Repeat in 7-10 days.
- 5. Apply South West Green *Maker* to fertilize the lawn.

# **NOTE**

Healthy grass *requires* sun. It requires a minimum of 4-6 hours per day. Grass in shady areas will be weakened and more susceptible to a multitude of diseases and pests including TARR.

# Retired Teachers:

Funding for Public Schools in Texas has been a great concern for Texas Retired Teachers for many years, and has been included in the concerns and goals for our organization.

This situation is affecting RISD, the school district where most of us spent years of our career. We love our school district and realize that the State's failure to fund education properly is having an adverse to our district. An important election is approaching in November; included will be an attempt to make up the funds not allocated from the state to insure the continuing success of RISD.

The following are excerpts from press releases offered by RISD. Read carefully and please vote in the November general election.

Under the Texas school finance system, RISD has received \$24.2 million less in state funding since 2014, and state funding is projected to decrease by another \$33.7 million over the next five years.

"The school finance system in Texas is broken," said RISD Superintendent, Dr. Jeannie Stone. "RISD's operating budget receives no recurring benefit from rising property values, yet the state continues to decrease its share of funding. The bottom line is that because of the outdated school funding system, RISD taxpayers must pay a higher share of the cost of public education."

"For those who believe in safe schools, outstanding teachers, and maintaining a strong district that meets the high expectations of our community, this action could no longer be avoided," said RISD Board President, Justin Bono. "From our highest achieving schools to our campuses and students in need of additional resources, RISD can no longer operate on the reduced state funding and revenue generated by a minimum operating tax rate."

### **RICHARDSON ISD TRUSTEES CALL TAX**

**RATIFICATION ELECTION** (Addresses School Safety, Class Sizes, Teacher Retention, Strategic Initiatives)

Richardson ISD trustees approved a budget that called for a 13 cent increase in the maintenance and operating tax rate from \$1.04 to \$1.17. RISD has held the tax rate steady at \$1.04 since 2007. The 13 cent increase equates to about \$100 more per \$100,000 value of a home for taxpayers younger than 65. Taxpayers who are 65 or older have their tax levy (levy = the amount they pay) frozen, and this tax increase will not impact their tax bill for RISD.

### **MONEY FROM THE TRE WILL:**

- Give teachers a raise.
- Increase paraprofessional and service employees to market rates.
- Hire additional teachers/aides for classroom instruction and special education.
- Add security personnel and enhance security measures at elementary schools.
- Continue to invest in Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs.
- Maintain reasonable class sizes (per state guidelines).

RISD has a long track record of using taxpayer funds wisely and consistently receives recognitions for financial efficiency from outside organizations and state agencies.

# THE TAX RATIFICATION (APPROVAL) ELECTION WILL BE ON THE GENERAL ELECTION DATE ON NOVEMBER 6, 2018.

If the TRE is not successful, the district will not be able to fund a salary increase needed to attract and retain quality teachers and staff; instead, the district will be forced to implement a hiring freeze that would result in increased class sizes. Additionally, RISD would have to consider eliminating academic programs and collecting fees for activities as part of additional cost-cutting measures to cover a projected \$13.3 million operating deficit over the next five years.

"Passage of a TRE is an essential step for our students, our teachers and our district," Stone said. "We have been operating on a 27 year-low tax rate, and we've reached the point where action is needed to protect what's great about our district and secure our future."






