Many options are now available to record the serial numbers and information about your valuables. Consider home inventory software, available for smartphones and computers and also on the internet in the form of cloud services.

CRIME WATCH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Richland Park/Oaks Crime Watch needs more volunteers to help patrol our neighborhood. We have fairly good coverage during the daytime, but are in need of help for nighttime. Unfortunately, late night is when we experience most of our problems. Therefore, we need more volunteers at night, every day of the week. This is a great way to get out, meet new people, learn new things and experience something different in life.

In order to join the Crime Watch Patrol, you will need to fill out an *application form* which we submit to the Richardson Police Department. The police will run a criminal background check on each applicant. Once all the paperwork has been cleared, the applicant will receive about six hours of training. All new applicants will also be assigned a patrol partner.

Crime Watch Patrols are extremely effective because criminals do not want to get caught by anyone, police or otherwise. So when you put those reflective signs on your cars and patrol the neighborhood, the bad guys tend to go some place else. The problem is we need to maintain these patrols at all hours in order to keep crime away.

Each shift usually consists of one and half hours of patrol time every other week (total of 3 hours per month.) The two shifts where we need the most help are evenings (7 p.m. to midnight) and deep nights (midnight to 6:00 a.m.).

Fuel your body. Fuel you Soil! by Mary Moseid



Not that anyone reading this asked, but I used to be a figure-class bodybuilding competitor. At the time, it was very important to me and as with all of my hobbies—I took it to the extreme. As my training progressed, I began to see all food as simply fuel. Flavor wasn't really a consideration to me, just how much protein, carbs, or fat I was ingesting. Depending on the needs of my body during the season, I would fuel myself accordingly. Sounds super fun, right? After a few years I became a bit bored, but I have recently reflected on the fact that I still see the world through the same lens. Now that my focus has shifted to gardening and actually seasoning my chicken, I see kitchen scraps, yard clippings, and random sticks on the ground as only nitrogen, phosphorus, or potassium. This ratio of nutrients, also known as

N-P-K, is very important to soil and plant life. Your soil's "gainz" depend on it.

Just as in the fitness world, there are a lot of "magic pills" offered in gardening and lawn care. Synthetic fertilizers make grand promises of quick growth, beautiful blooms, and low maintenance. You don't really know what's in it or how it works, but who cares right? Results are king...right? Ah, but where is the flavor?! Maybe that's the real reason I got into gardening, so I could finally enjoy and taste my food again. There is a reason my homegrown, organic watermelons blow your store bought ones out of the water. Compost baby, compost!



Summer bodies are made in the winter, and the same goes for soil. Things take time, so always be composting! Pictured here is my full bowl of kitchen scraps from a single winter soup dinner. I don't see celery stalks and onion peels, though, I see fuel. I see future compost that will feed my poor mandarin tree, clinging to life

wrapped in a beach towel, as long as it survives until Summer. Here are some tips for turning your kitchen scraps, lawn clippings, and tree trimmings into food for your lawn and gardens all year round.

MY METHOD

If it seems like I have a lot of extra time on my hands, I really don't. So my method of composting is very hands-off. I let time and nature do its thing and I come to collect when it's ready. I took a 32-gallon trash bin, drilled holes in the bottom for drainage, and stuck it in the shadiest corner of my backyard. To get started, I filled it half way up with green grass (Nitrogen), dried grass clippings, brown leaves, or sticks (Carbon). From there, I drop my kitchen scraps in, cover with more green and brown, rinse (literally, hose it down), and repeat. It will need to be turned once a month or so to give it some air and to break up clumps that form. I do this by tipping the bin over, give it a few pokes with a shovel, then refill the bin. I guess I do miss my workouts just a bit!

OTHER METHODS

My method may not be for you, and that's fine! There are other options and products available. One such product is a turning compost bin. They range wildly in price, but I like to keep things simple when it comes to gadgets.



Pictured here is the turning bin of a fellow Richland Park gardener. This method is said to break down matter faster due to oxygen made readily available by the turning, boasting 6-8 weeks or less depending on outside temperatures.

One aspect of this method that I am not a fan of is that it isn't connected to the ground. So you may not be finding many worms naturally coming to your compost. But at the same time, maybe less ants as well.

Another gadget that I didn't even realize was a thing until a month or so ago is the countertop compost machine. There are many options available now ranging from about \$300-500. You put your food waste in, press a button, and by the next day you have soil to add to your garden! What a time to be alive.

With the outdoor options, over the next few months through a balance of moisture, bacteria, certain insect larvae, worms, and Mother Nature herself- the organic material will all start to break down and become unrecognizable. But for your soil, and all the millions of living organisms it contains, it's as good as gold. All the nutrients your plants need are highly

bioavailable when it is presented in this state. Just layer a couple inches of compost of anything you think needs a little boost, and your work is done. It can even be spread on your lawn, replacing the synthetic nitrogen fertilizers that often get washed into our water systems and kill your soil life. Plus, it didn't cost you a thing but a trip outside.

DOs and DON'Ts

I may be a bit laissez-faire about how I compost, but there are a few general guidelines I like to keep in mind:

- book.
- spot.

• DO keep Carbon to Nitrogen ratio stable. These are your browns and greens. Carbon is your dried leaves, straw, sticks, wood chips, and even shredded cardboard and paper. Nitrogen is your vegetable scraps, spent coffee grounds, fresh grass clippings and manure from herbivores only such as rabbits, chickens, cows, and horses in moderation. You want to keep the browns to greens at a 3:1 ratio, in my experience. This is to keep things from getting too moist, or too anaerobic. Both can lead to a stinky and moldy pile, which is a DON'T in my

• DO keep the moisture level at that of a wet sponge. In our Texas summers, this may require a bit of added water from time to time and it is best to keep your pile in a shady

• DON'T add any meats, dairy, oils or processed foods: You want ants? That's how you get

ants. And maggots. Earlier I mentioned "certain" insect larvae. Black soldier fly larvae are amazing composters that are attracted to rotting wood. They won't be too much of a bother as adults, if you even see them at all. The common fly will lay its eggs near rotting meat, and the maggots grow up to fly into your face while you are trying to relax on the patio, which I personally do not enjoy!

• DON'T be intimidated by the process or ratios. It doesn't have to be perfect, and there's no ruining a compost pile if you stick to plant material. Just add more of what you are lacking, and let nature take its course.

When something peaks my interest, I go all in. I want to be the best and most knowledgeable in the given arena. I converted my entire side yard into a raised garden oasis the same year I began. What can I say? I got it from my daddy. Intense might as well be my maiden name. But while bodybuilding was centered around control- control of yourself and what people think of you through regimented diet and exercise, gardening is the opposite. What control do you have over the weather, the worms? And, I don't think I'll get on stage to have judges critique my compost pile any time soon.

Gardening is humbling, and no amount of intensity will get you ahead. All we can do is create a favorable environment and hope for the best, as with many things in life.

It has great quality hand-crafted beer brewed in Richardson, with various craft beers on tap and beer to go, six pack and growlers fills to go at a discounted price. The taproom features a variety of brews including IPAs, Bocks, Porters, and Stouts. The Taproom is available for rentals and private parties and also features a large outside patio. It is a great local place to meet up with friends. Look for special events at Four Bullets that feature music and food trucks.









Eiland Coffee and Roaster

Eiland Coffee, located at 532 N Interurban, sells high end specialty coffee. Eiland coffee roasters have been roasting deep in the heart of Richardson since 1998. They roast single origin coffee and sell to coffee shops and restaurants all over the DFW area and at their location on Interurban. Eiland uses the best roaster, a 1969 Probat cast-iron roaster, which is widely regarded as the best coffee roaster ever made. They believe in coffee and the people who drink it. They are opening a coffee shop later this year in Canyon Creek. At the Interurban location, they sell coffee beans by the pound and will grind to your specification. It is a great place to go and pick up a pound or two of coffee along with a great cup of coffee.


