# CRIME Crime Watch **Report**

Bob McClure, Head of our Neighborhood Crime Watch, wanted to share with you a scam he learned about from one of our neighbors. It sounds like the neighbor did the right thing by asking more questions, and wanting to verify before taking action.

### RNA Neighbor: Scam Alert...

"I received a phone call that was very believable. He said he was a police officer with the Richardson Police and that I had two warrants due to failure to appear for jury duty. He gave all the right answers and said in order to fix it I had to appear in front of a judge for a Zoom call. Much of what he said seemed true (much longer than what I am saying here).

But when he said I needed to pay a fine for each warrant before talking to the judge and then I would get a code for a refund, my alert bells went off. Then the fact that he said it was \$2500 for each and that he was going to transfer me to the Treasury Department (not the Richardson Court) I told him I was going to call the court to check it out before doing anything. He told me I couldn't do that. I hung

I talked to the Police Department, and learned this is a current scam that's going around. So please beware. These people say all the right things and make you really believe what they are saying. Thank goodness I didn't give him any personal information, other than he already had my name and address."

### **CRIME WATCH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED**

The Richland Park/Oaks Crime Watch needs more volunteers to help patrol our neighborhood. We have fairly good coverage during the daytime, but are in need of help for nighttime. Unfortunately, late night is when we experience most of our problems. Therefore, we need more volunteers at night, every day of the week. This is a great way to get out, meet new people, learn new things and experience something different in life.

In order to join the Crime Watch Patrol, you will need to fill out an application form which we submit to the Richardson Police Department. The police will run a criminal background check on each applicant. Once all the paperwork has been cleared, the applicant will receive about six hours of training. All new applicants will also be assigned a patrol partner.

Crime Watch Patrols are extremely effective because criminals do not want to get caught by anyone, police or otherwise. So when you put those reflective signs on your cars and patrol the neighborhood, the bad guys tend to go some place else. The problem is we need to maintain these patrols at all hours in order to keep crime away.

Each shift usually consists of one and half hours of patrol time every other week (total of 3 hours per month.) The two shifts where we need the most help are evenings (7 p.m. to midnight) and deep nights (midnight to 6:00 a.m.).

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# Gardening Tips for Garden Fixes

Gardens are blooming! It has been wonderful to hear how many of our neighbors have taken, expanded or about to take a new interest in gardening. From flower or decorative gardens to full "victory" (food) gardens! We also have so many levels of expertise in our neighborhood and love the way we have helped each other and shared resources to better our community. Here are the basics on how to improve the health of our plants (list of most common):

Fall Crops: Remember, the end of July and August are the best months to start fall crops; and the sooner, the better! As we only have about 3-4 months to harvest in the fall.



What to plant? Potatoes, any root vegetable (beets, carrots, turnips, radishes, parsnips), garlic and onions, green beans and any other bean, herbs like cilantro, parsley, fenugreek, most herbs can also be planted, greens such as kale, chards, spinach, lettuce, mustard greens, our loved brassicas broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower, pumpkins and squashes, etc.

Missing	What to look for?	How to fix it
Magnesium	<ul><li>Leaves turn yellow.</li><li>Leaf veins are green.</li><li>Growth has halted.</li></ul>	Dolomitic lime and Epsom salts. Seen a lot in tomatoes! Apply 1 Tbsp. of Epsom salts directly to plant when planting and every 90 days for the life of the plant.
Nitrogen	<ul><li>Leaves are yellow.</li><li>Plant becomes a lighter green.</li><li>Growth is halted</li></ul>	Alfalfa meal, blood meal, fish emulsion or meal. If you have fish or sea food - blend the shell and bones. Apply smoothy to plant. To avoid critters, make a hole apply and cover.
Potassium	<ul><li> Tips of leaves become yellow.</li><li> Tips then turn brown.</li><li> Stems become weak.</li></ul>	Granite meal, greensand, Sul-Po-Mag, wood ashes. The best way to recycle your banana peels – blend, apply to plant and cover.
Zinc	<ul><li>Leaves become yellow.</li><li>Leaf veins are green.</li><li>Growth has halted.</li><li>Leaves get thicker.</li></ul>	Chelated zinc spray, kelp extract or meal. As a preventive tip, try planting garlic, legumes, squash, peas, pumpkins, spinach. Can also add oyster shell powder (1-2 tsp form Feed Store in their chicken feed dept.)



To keep your veggies for a longer time wash and blanch/cook, freeze, dehydrate, can, or ferment.

# Famous Taco "Faux" Guacamole Salsa

Ever wondered why the "guacamole" salsa at restaurants never turn dark? Well, the reason is that even though it taste like guacamole, it is not. This salsa was created to keep costs down and is used in restaurants as guacamole salsa. It is the best kept secret in the Mexican Cuisine, being equally good and delicious.

### Ingredients:

- 3 cups of hot water
- 1 Zucchini (light green) sliced ½ in.
- 4 peeled tomatillos (discard husk)
- 4 tbsp of olive oil
- 2 jalapeños, sliced
- 1 small white or yellow onion, sliced
- 2 cloves of garlic
- 1 bunch of cilantro, cut in chunks
- Salt to taste
- 1 lime (optional directly to food on salsa)

- 1. In a pan add water and zucchini and heat for about 1-2 minutes on medium high. Add tomatillos and cook together for 3-5 minutes or until tomatillos change color to a pale green. Do not let them burst because it can become acidic. Remove from heat, discard water and only place zucchini and tomatillo into blender.
- 2. Sauté in oil the onion, jalapeños, and at the end add the garlic. Do this for about 2 minutes, but do not let them burn. Remove from stove, cool down a few minutes and add all to blender including oil.
- 3. Add cilantro and salt to blender (start with increments of ½ tsp of salt until desired taste) and blend until emulsified (silky creamy). Let it cool or you can use hot. It will keep in refrigerator for 3-5 days.

Leftovers can be used for meats, vegetables, rice, eggs, quesadillas, soups, etc.

# **Trash Bash**

The RNA could use more people to participate in our monthly trash bash on the second Saturday of the month at 9:00 a.m. We meet at the park on the Lois Lane side to pick up the trash bags, grabbers for the trash and your assignment. It will only take about an hour of your time to help keep the wall around our neighborhood clean and trash free. It is also a good way to meet your neighborhood one week before the trash clean-up and just show up; no need to RSVP.



### **Draining the Pool**

Please do not drain your pool water into the alley, gutter or street. It is illegal. When draining large amounts of pool water use the home's sewer clean-out riser for a properly flowing sewer lateral. Locate your sewer clean-out – a threaded, usually black cap about 3 or 4 inches in diameter.

If you cannot find the clean-out consult a plumber. You may need to have one installed. The City of Richardson code of ordinances (RCO), specifically prohibits the discharge of filter backwash water (such as from your pool) into the storm drain system.

Remember, we want to prevent water pollution and protect the watershed we live in.



### Watch where you step...

The weather is getting warmer which brings more people out walking their dogs. It's nice to see the four-legged fur babies and their owners enjoying their outing. Most dog owners are responsible, and the neighborhood thanks you for picking up after your dog.

However, it appears that not everyone is cleaning up after their dog has deposited a pile in someone's yard. Please be mindful of your neighbors. It is the responsibility of the dog owner to pick up the poop.

Also, please do not throw your poop bags in the recycled bags of grass clippings and tree limbs that are on the curb for pick up. The plastic bags and poop contaminate the clippings. If you walk around the park there are receptacles or take it home to put in your trash.

Remember, the park provides poop bags, if needed. Thank you for keeping our neighborhood looking beautiful!

### Citizen Fire Academy

I just completed this wonderful program and highly recommend it. It gives you a view of the inner workings of the fire department. During the program you may sign up to spend up to two days at one of the six Richardson fire stations and ride out with the firefighters on their calls.

I spent two days of ride outs, experiencing a drug-user overdose, two car fires, a house fire, and helping an elderly man back onto his scooter. All the incidents were handled with such care and professionalism.

I experienced eating meals with the firemen and asked many questions about their career. I spent a couple of informative days at the fire station with some amazing, dedicated professionals.

Also, during the program I had the opportunity to climb the firetruck ladder during the program – 80 feet up! For someone who is afraid of heights, it was incredible.

We handled the fire hose, which is harder than it looks, and took apart a car with the "jaws of life", and so much more. I learned so much during these 10 weeks, which went very fast.

I'm glad I applied and was selected to be a part of this program. The applications become available in January, if you would like to apply. I would be glad to answer any questions you have about the program.

The Citizen Fire Academy is a dynamic 10-week program held in the Spring each year. It is designed to provide citizens of Richardson with an inside view of the organization and operations of the Richardson Fire Department.

The program includes live demonstrations, classroom learning plus hands-on experiences - all of which are intended to give the participant a true feel for the RFD.

Citizen Fire Academy participants must be at least 21 years of age and live or work in the city of Richardson.

There is no cost to attend the Citizen Fire Academy. Enrollment is limited.

Classes in the CFA are taught by professional; career firefighters and the curriculum includes:

- Overview of RFD
- History of the Fire Service
- Tour of Training Center and Fire Station 1
- Training Section/Physical Performance Assessment
- Vehicle Extrication (Jaws of Life)
- Fire Ground Operations
- Emergency Medical Services (EMS)
- Hazardous materials
- Search and rescue
- Fire prevention and investigation
- Office of Emergency Management
- 911 Communications
- Pre-Flashover Demonstration

### **Richardson 150 Anniversary**

The City of Richardson is celebrating its 150th anniversary with a June 24 party in downtown Richardson. The event will feature live music on two stages, games, a children's area and the revealing of the city of Richardson 1973 time capsule that was buried outside the library for the City's 100 anniversary.

### **Library and City Hall**

The bond passed for replacing the City Hall that had fire damage earlier this year. The library bond remodel was approved at an earlier election.

Because of the fire at the city hall the remodel was put on hold until the outcome of the city hall bond election. The city employees have been housed at several location through the city with little interruption of city services. It will be 3-4 years for the completion of a new city hall and the remodeling of the library to be completed and be move in ready.

The city has signed a 3 1/2year lease for a building at the corner of Plano and Greenville. (2360 Campbell Creek Blvd) to house the library and the city employees. The city has done an amazing job of keeping all the departments functioning despite the difficulty of the varied work spaces. The move will be completed sometime in the fall.

### Richardson Summer Aquatics Programs

Wonderful news, all the Richardson pools are fully staffed this summer. The city has worked very hard to make this happen. The pools are Heights Family Aquatic Center, Canyon Creek, Cottonwood, Glenville, and Terrace. Last year the city wanted to make sure all neighborhood pools, which were used primary by Richardson residents, were open. The Aquatic center had limited days depending on the availability of life guards. Heights Family Aquatic Center and neighborhood polls will officially open on June 3. Check times and day closures on the city web site.
