HI NEIGHBORS!

Hope all of you are doing fine in these hard times of Covid 19. We are still having too many car burglaries. Take your items out and lock your doors. They won't break the windows unless you leave valuables in it. So take and lock.

On Sunday, November 29th about 11:45 p.m. we had a home invasion on a retired couple in the 600 Blk of Wentworth. Four thieves in hoodies kicked in the front door and woke the man up sleeping in the den in his chair. His wife who was asleep heard the noise and started down the hall and saw another man, ran back to the bedroom and called 911. About that same time the house alarm went off and the thieves ran out the door. So keep your doors locked and SET THOSE ALARMS WHEN YOU ARE *HOME*. They work if set.

Don't advertise what you got for Christmas by putting the box on the curb for pick up. The bad guys drive around to see who got the big screen TV, Playstation, Xbox, and so on. It only takes a few minutes to cut those boxes down and put into trash bags, you will be glad you did.

If you need an RNA sticker to go on your back window of your car or truck just let me know. These help us a lot when on patrol to see what cars belong in the neighborhood.

Watch for porch pirates. RPD is looking for a White Mini Cooper with red top that has been involved in many instances. Call 911 if you see it.

CRIME WATCH VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Richland Park/Oaks Crime Watch needs more volunteers to help patrol our neighborhood. We have fairly good coverage during the daytime, but are in need of help for nighttime. Unfortunately, late night is when we experience most of our problems. Therefore, we need more volunteers at night, every day of the week. This is a great way to get out, meet new people, learn new things and experience something different in life.

In order to join the Crime Watch Patrol, you will need to fill out an application form which we submit to the Richardson Police Department. The police will run a criminal background check on each applicant. Once all the paperwork has been cleared, the applicant will receive about six hours of training. All new applicants will also be assigned a patrol partner.

Crime Watch Patrols are extremely effective because criminals do not want to get caught by anyone, police or otherwise. So when you put those reflective signs on your cars and patrol the neighborhood, the bad guys tend to go some place else. The problem is we need to maintain these patrols at all hours in order to keep crime away.

Each shift usually consists of one and half hours of patrol time every other week (total of 3 hours per month.) The two shifts where we need the most help are evenings (7 p.m. to midnight) and deep nights (midnight to 6:00 a.m.).

They were already nearing the end of their life span from the Texas sun when the tornado last October hit them extra hard. Finally, these sign toppers are in production and will be replaced in the first quarter of next year!

Keep a look out for these fresh reminders of how our neighborhood is ever changing and ever improving.

Signs in City Parks

To help ensure Richardson's parks stay clean, there are regulations in place regarding the placement of signs in city parks. Thank you for being a partner and helping us take care of your neighborhood park!

- Neighborhood Association event signage is considered off-premise signage and is regulated by a city ordinance.
- Placement of off-premise signage including signs promoting HOA meetings, social gatherings, neighborhood parties, advertisements, school district events, fundraisers, civic organizations, membership drives and garage sales is prohibited in city parks.
- Signs may be placed on private property and medians within the subdivision or in areas maintained by homeowners' or neighborhood associations. Placement of signs outside of these areas can interfere with park maintenance crews when they are mowing and watering. Sign replacement can be costly to the homeowners or neighborhood association if signs are damaged or destroyed due to maintenance activities.
- With advance notice, the Parks and Recreation Department will work with neighborhoods regarding the placement of signs in parks on the actual day of an event.

If you see any private advertising or similar signage in your neighborhood park, report it to 972-744-4111 and the Parks and Recreation Department will remove it as soon as possible.

HOW TO CARE FOR YOUR TREE DURING THE WINTER

Help Your Tree Survive in Cold Conditions

Winter is here and for most of us that means taking out a blanket and cuddling inside next to the heater for a few months. Our trees, however, don't get that option and must endure what the Texas weather has in store.

Here are a few measures you can take to ensure your tree endures the upcoming Winter months with as little stress and damage as possible:

PRUNE


Throughout the Winter, most trees go into a state of dormancy where they drop their leaves, put photosynthesis on hold, and hibernate while living off food stored away in the roots. This time of dormancy is a great time to prune your tree.

Have you noticed any dead, dying, or damaged limbs now that the leaves have fallen? Prune then out before a high wind knocks them out of the canopy and damages anything below. Even if you have a young, newly planted tree, now is a perfect time to do a little structural pruning to give it a good start at life.

MULCH

Another proactive step you can take to get your tree ready for Winter is by spreading mulch around your tree or refreshing an existing mulch bed. During the colder months, a nice 1–2-inch layer of mulch around the tree helps insulate the roots and soil against dramatic

swings in temperature that can cause serious damage and death in a trees root system.



Mulch also helps to retain moisture in the soil around the tree. This is particularly helpful if we have a dryer winter and the tree gets very little ambient moisture. Remember to spread your mulch around the base of the tree. Do not pile it up around the trunk of the tree. Too much mulch piled up around the trunk of the tree holds too much moisture in and creates a perfect environment for insects, fungi, and other pest to feed on your tree.

WATER

Just because its cold outside and your tree is going dormant doesn't mean your tree has stopped needing water. By turning your sprinkler system off completely over the colder months, you cut your tree off from its normal source of water.

Younger and newly planted trees need to retain a regular source of

water until they can grow a root system large enough to sustain themselves. If you look at the weather and don't see any rain in the 2-week forecast, plan to water your tree with 10-15 gallons of water within that two-week period.


FREEZE PREVENTION

While checking for possible rain, be sure to note any days that may approach freezing temperatures. Mature, indigenous trees will need little attention, but if you have any tree species that originate from warmer, more tropical climates, you should plan to either bring them inside or provide some form of protection from the cold.



An easy way to protect a young or tropical tree from the cold is simply by covering it with trash bags, tarps, or towels to provide a layer of insulation from the freezing temperature. Along with covering your tree, make sure the soil around the tree is thoroughly saturated with water. Water retains a greater amount of heat than air, so having moist soil helps keep the soil around the tree warmer.

WAYS TO KEEP HEALTHY AND ENJOY THE OUTDOORS

In Richardson there are 87 miles of trails of hard surfaces and 6 miles of soft surface (mostly in Breckinridge Park). There are three trail projects in Richardson that have been completed in the last month. The Duck Creek Trail extension and the Breckinridge Park Trails Connections projects were completed in early December and the Spring Creek Nature Area Phase II project, was completed at the end of November. Take time to check out these wonderful resources to enjoy nature and get some exercise.



KEEPING THE WATER FLOWING

The city of Richardson along with 12 other member cities, signed an amended contract with the North Texas Municipal Water District Board on October 29 approving a new rate methodology for cost-sharing of the regional water system. Under the original contract, each member city paid its share of costs based on its

highest annual water demand. The transition to the new cost-sharing structure will be phased in over the next 13 years and will take into account the higher usage of growing cities and the lower usage of established cities who effectively use water conservation measures.



SUPPORT FOR VETERANS

Texas representatives of the Military Order of Purple Heart presented the council with a plaque designating Richardson as a Purple Heart City. Achieving the designation is part of the city's ongoing support of veterans. That support includes special benefits for veterans employed by the city, sponsored Veteran's Day ceremonies and the Veterans Partnership Initiative (VIP) website.



GREAT FOOD IN RICHARDSON!

Richardson was named one of the "best foodie cities" in the country (and the best in Texas) by apartmentguide.com. Richardson

was ranked 33rd in the nation out of 314 cities with a population of more than 100,000. The ranking was based on the number of restaurants per capita, restaurant density per square mile of land, and the percentage of non-chain restaurants. Richardson is one of the most diverse areas in the Metroplex for ethnic food with restaurants serving Cajun, Vietnamese, Peruvian, Ethiopian, and other cuisine.



CITY IMPROVEMENTS


Plans are under way for a potential 2021 bond program with no tax increase.

- Look for the next Shred Event to occur sometime after Tax Day. Hope you can make it and get some of your Spring cleaning out of the way.






























Network in critical need of volunteers

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

Richardson Neighborhood Watch Program Established 1983

The Neighborhood Watch program is a self-help community crime prevention program focusing on the reduction of crime and the opportunity for crime to occur.

More than 7 million residential burglaries are committed annually, one every ten seconds. With a continuation of this increase expected, closer cooperation between the police and the citizens they serve is mandatory. Because local governments most likely will be unable to pay the increased costs for additional police services, the Neighborhood Watch program can play an important role in the future of our communities.

Neighborhood Watch was created to obtain citizen involvement in discouraging and preventing residential crime. Neighborhood Watch programs are not designed to substitute for police protection. Rather, they supplement police activities by providing extra



eyes, ears and caring. Neighborhood Watch is "people looking out for one another" and is considered a major deterrent against crime.

When neighbors know each other personally, they are more aware of each other's habits and routines. This awareness can alert them to peculiarities and unusual events, such as strange cars or persons in the neighborhood. When neighbors know one another, they are more willing to get involved in reporting if they suspect a crime is occurring.

NEIGHBORHOOD CRIME FACTS

- Burglary, auto theft, rape, crimes against children and arson are the most common neighborhood crimes.
- One of the more frequently committed crimes in the nation, residential burglary is one of the EASIEST crimes to commit, but one of the more difficult crimes to solve.

 Statistics show that in a significant number of household burglaries there is NO forced entry. In Richardson, nearly half of all reported residential burglaries are attributable to open garage doors.



- The majority of home burglaries occur during daylight hours (8 a.m. to 5 p.m.).
- There is a potential for a violent confrontation when a property owner surprises a burglar.
- In a recent study conducted by the Sacramento County Sheriff, interviews were conducted with 25 convicted burglars serving time at Folsom State Prison. Twenty-three said that they avoided homes displaying Neighborhood Crime Watch stickers in the windows.

Once all the paperwork has cleared, you will receive about six hours of training and be assigned a patrol partner. Each shift usually consists of one and a half hours of patrol time every other week (total of 3 hours per month).

Crime Watch Patrols are extremely effective because criminals do not want to get caught by anyone, police or otherwise. So when you put those reflective signs on your cars and patrol the neighborhood, the bad guys tend to go some place else.
