Afterward, product packaging should be cut down and placed in trash bags so as not to advertise your recent purchases in the alleys. Crooks will drive our alleys and "shop."

Consider adding a video doorbell camera to your gift list for yourself.



If you plan to be away during the holidays, be aware that RPD has a free House Watch Program. Trained "Volunteers in Police Service" will check on your home for up to four weeks, as their schedule permits. 




#### TRASH BASH

## RNA GENERAL MEETING



Thank you to all who attended the RNA yearly general meeting on Tuesday, November 12th. Don Magner gave an update of what is going on in the city. Some exciting news, the Dream Café is moving into the former GAPCO location in Lockwood. This will be a wonderful addition to this area. The Main Street apartments are open and around 100 have already been leased. A pizza restaurant has moved into one of the commercial spaces and another restaurant is getting ready to open.

Bill Gattus gave us an update on what is going on at Richland Elementary. He has been remarkably busy since he became principal last year. He has formed numerous clubs to support the many interests of the students. He is looking for volunteers to make the school a true neighborhood school with neighborhood support. If you want to tour the school and check out what is going on and how you can become involved notify the school and set up a time to tour.

Lindsey Turman, Community Services Director talked of the many services of the city when it comes to keeping the city of Richardson beautiful, including a new program called Home Sweet Home that will be implemented next year.

Thank you again to all who attended; we appreciate your time in learning new ways to become involved and seeing what is going on in the city and your neighborhood.

#### **STREET REPAIRS**

Streets were discussed at the general meeting, especially the 400 and 500 blocks of Tiffany Trail. The city engineers evaluated these two blocks, and it requires a complete redo which will need to be part of a bond election. In the meantime, it was suggested by the city that these streets, along with other deteriorated streets, be repaired by using asphalt to make them safer and more drivable until the next bond election. Richardson workers are going through the entire city

evaluating streets. The areas are divided into 28 sections. We are section 24, and they are currently on section 20. Due to cost and the time needed to make repairs, only one section can be completed each year. Therefore, we are still about four years out from getting the new streets replaced. We can opt for asphalt until it is our turn for replacements. The use of asphalt option will not delay the repairs, just make the streets more drivable in the meantime. Your RNA board will be working with the city to ensure asphalt repairs are made to our streets.

- Christmas An annual festival commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ, observed primarily on December 25 as a religious and cultural celebration among billions of people around the world.



## In the Kitchen...Back to the Basics of Eating by Yeni Gutierrez

There are some basic rules for eating and making your kitchen work for you! Let's go through some...

- 1) Use filtered water to reduce toxins in your body and since you are filtering the water, it would be a good idea to add some minerals back by adding a pinch of Celtic or sea salt (around 5-10 grains). Source: Barbara O'Neill. Speaker, Author of "Self-Heal by Design," Natural Health Educator
- 2) Reduce highinsulin spikes after eating, by consuming your food in the "Right Order."
- a. Start with Vegetables (The fiber protects glucose molecules from arriving too quickly at the intestine and into the blood by reducing the high-insulin spike Gastric Emptying.)
- b. Next, eat Proteins and Fats (This controls the suppression of ghrelin, the hormone that makes us hungry. By eating in the Right Order, it could signal hunger an average of 4-5 hours later, instead of 2 hours after eating, which could reduce the effects of type II diabetes when

lowering the Fasting Glucose Levels.)

- c. End the Meal with Carbs, but not required to consume (Subdivided in starches and carbs includes anything that tastes sweet). High-spikes in insulin are not healthy, but low-spikes are normal. By following the Right Order of eating, it will reduce high spikes in the body. No need to wait in between categories; just follow the intake order of a-b-c. So, hold the bread until after you've eaten veggies, proteins, and fats to make the best and healthiest out of the meal! Source: Jessie Inchauspé, Biochemist - "the Glucose Goddess" and Bestseller Author "Glucose Revolution."
- 3) Balance vitamins by adding fresh and natural ingredients when eating. Our body is composed of many elements, which require certain levels of vitamins and minerals to better function. Using natural ingredients helps to complement what is missing. It is difficult to overeat veggies because they will be filling. They are not dense in calories and should be the largest portion on your plate. In return, the

levels of fiber increase. and potassium counters the high-level sodium found in processed foods (which we should try to reduce or avoid). Veggies do not need to be boringly steamed, but can be seasoned, cooked, roasted, and built into a more flavorful meal. They can be consumed raw, blended as juices, fermented, sprouted, added to soups, created as a side, or even featured as the main dish! Source Dr. Joseph Mercola, Founder of Mercola.com, Bestselling Author "Effortless Healing" and Health **Expert** 

A clever way to start adding more vegetables is this three-ingredient wonder! Combine 100 grams of each allpurpose flour and steamcooked sweet potato (still warm). Add 1 tsp. of salt and mix well to create a dough. It is important to weigh ingredients to make them even. Separate into portions and roll into balls. Flatten to 1/8-1/4" thick and cook on medium heat until both sides are done. You can call them tortillas, naan, roti...and it goes well with chicken veggie soup!

#### IN THE GARDEN...

Try something new this year! Ever considered growing papayas in Richardson?

Well, you can if you want to. Here is how I do it. Buy a ripened papaya (must look darkened like a banana before going black), save the seeds, and enjoy the papaya! Plant the seeds. Keep your new plant inside your home, then plant outside around the 2nd week of April.

Papaya trees need to be replanted every 2 years. Older trees can get bugs and sickness. It takes about 11 months before the tree will bear fruit. (Side note: you can eat up to 10 seeds a day. I save them, dry them, and crush them as a healthy alternative to black pepper).

#### **Winter Water Schedule is now in effect**

- Starting November 1st, residents can water their yards at any time on their twice-per-week designated watering days to avoid freezing temperatures. (Even house numbers on Tuesday and Saturday and Odd on Wednesday and Sunday)
- If sprinklers run overnight during freezing weather, they can cause dangerous conditions on roads and sidewalks.

# City Secretary received municipal clerk of the year award

- Richardson City Secretary, Aimee Nemer received the 2024 Texas Municipal Clerk of the Year Award at the Texas Municipal Clerks Association's (TMCA) annual banquet.
- The honor recognizes individuals who exemplify outstanding service to their communities and fellow clerks statewide.
- As a past president of the TMCA, Amiee has a long tenure of service at the state and local level. She has served in every role of the TMCA Executive Board and almost every committee at some point in her Career. If you see Aimee be sure to congratulate her on this great accomplishment.

#### City Council's Legislature Agenda

- Richardson City Council recently reviewed priorities for the proposed legislature agenda ahead of the 2025 state and federal legislature sessions.
- The agenda, aligned with City Council Goals and Strategies will guide efforts to protect municipal interests and engage with legislators.
- Key priorities include:
- Maintain the ability of locally elected officials to address the needs of residents and stakeholders.
- Oppose actions that limit municipalities' home rule authority or impose unfunded mandates, restricting cities' ability to manage resources.
- Support legislation to restore home rule authority lost in previous legislation.

• Support legislation that ensures the City Council can use public funds to communicate with legislators and state agencies and pay membership dues to organizations with lobbyists.

#### **Aquatics Master Plan Update**

- City Staff provided an update on the development of Aquatic Master Plan, pare of the 2023 Parks, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan, to determine long-term strategies for aquatic services and facilities in Richardson.
- The study includes an assessment of current facilities, a market analysis, and public input through open houses, stakeholders' meetings, and an online survey.
- Finding included
- Many neighborhood pools need to be updated and improvements like replastering, ADA upgrades and increased shade.
- The Northeast Richardson/Breckinridge Park area lacks a nearby pool (over 7 minutes away), and residents have expressed interest in a facility.
- Many residents have requested an indoor pool for year-round use.
- After gathering City Council feedback, the planning team hosted follow-up community meetings, completed an additional online survey, and will present it to the Council again in December.

#### THE PLATINUM CLUB CARD

The Platinum Club Card is free for members of the RISD community who are at least 55 years old.

This membership program allows for free or reduced admission to most RISD athletic events and fine arts shows. You need to register online for the new Platinum Club Card – formerly known as the Silver AdvantAGE card – for free access to the school district's games and shows.

Members will get access to other RISD events and special learning opportunities throughout the school year. Members will receive a monthly calendar of events along with details on other membership perks via email. Spaces are limited to events, and Platinum Club Card members must sign up to attend.

The Platinum Club Card enables members to attend school district activities held in Richardson ISD facilities, including school concerts, musicals, plays, athletic events, and much more, free of charge. The only exception is varsity football games and UIL playoff games.


#### RISD VOLUNTEERING

RISD uses VOLY, a volunteer management system, to post volunteer opportunities and find volunteers. To volunteer on an RISD campus, you will need to create a VOLY account by visiting the VOLY website.


Richardson ISD requires every volunteer to pre-register with VOLY annually to be eligible for volunteer opportunities during each school year. RISD also requires each volunteer to undergo a background check before working with students.

You will be prompted to complete the background check during the VOLY account creation or preregistration process. Watch for background check approval, which can take up to a week.

Once approved, you will be able to sign up directly for volunteer opportunities through the VOLY platform. Stay on the lookout for new opportunities for your campus as well as other district opportunities!

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


