Negotiating the neighborhood is a challenge these days but the City of Richardson expects the project to be finished this year.

Work on Abrams Road moves forward

According to City of Richardson (COR) officials, northbound paving operations on Abrams have begun with all thru traffic detoured to Greenville Avenue between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Local traffic is scheduled to be detoured on Tiffany, Sheffield, Birch, Fieldwood and Park Bend as the paving operation moves north through the area. Tiffany's new water line has now been installed and re-paving is in progress in anticipation of the detour.

Northbound paving operations in the constricted residential area between Tiffany and Park Bend have begun with the section between Park Bend and Centennial set to begin March 27.

Following the paving operation in the constricted residential area, north and southbound traffic will again be allowed on Abrams Road.

COR anticipates each section to take approximately seven days to complete the main lanes. In addition, another couple of weeks will be needed in each section to finish driveways, alleys, and intersections. North and southbound traffic will remain on Abrams Road but will be stopped in each direction for a short duration and flagged around equipment. Residents affected by alley closures will receive a separate letter advising them of the progress.

The 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. construction timeline is designed to accelerate the paving operation and reduce necessary detour days. COR is also working with Richland Elementary to minimize student-related traffic issues.

Reports on budget, crime, & beautification plus area development take center stage

Budget: Treasurer, Bill Greenhaw, reported that membership is stable with 548 out of 965 households paying dues for 2007. Matching funds from the City of Richardson are being used to improve neighborhood entrances. The Board will continue to apply for funds as appropriate. The Board is also rethinking budget and spending for 2008. A follow-up will be presented at the spring meeting.

Architecture, Landscaping & Beautification: Curtis Dorian reported that HOA funds and COR matching funds will upgrade Audelia Road and Lois Lane entrances. Progress continues on the Walnut entrances with entry beds, planned lighting, and improvements on the medians. Signage in the entry medians will replace the aging signs (now missing many letters) on screening walls. In all, seven entrances will be revitalized by the city. The screening wall on Park Bend (funded during last year's bond election) is expected to begin in August 2008.

Crime: Bob McClure reported that crime stats through October included: 11 thefts from motor vehicles, 18 actual motor vehicle thefts, 22 burglaries and 4 breaking and enterings. Recommendations for added safety include: locking your back door; varying the neighborhood entrances you use; closing your garage door—ALWAYS—and turning outside lights on each night (front AND back). Mail theft is also on the rise so it is recommended that residents have locking mailboxes or a mail chute through the fence. Most burglaries come through garage doors. Finally, please join your neighborhood crime watch group. (A form is on page 11 of this newsletter.)

Guest speaker Kimberly Schofield, an entomologist from Texas A&M Urban Solutions Center, talked about community-based methods for controlling Texas fire ants.

City Leaders, Gary Slagel, City Council Place 4, Bob Townsend, City Council Place 1 & Mayor Pro Tem, Steve Mitchell, City Council Place 6 and Mayor, Dennis Stewart, City Council Place 7 and David Morgan, Assistant City Manager-Community Services, took questions from the audience. Highlights follow.

Abrams Road Construction—The Abrams Road project should be complete in March or April depending upon the weather. Once completed, Abrams will have four lanes with a center turn lane.

Water Pressure Problems —Water lines last only about 30 years and once repairs reach a certain level the entire line has to be replaced. The Abrams Road construction is causing some water pressure problems which the city believes will disappear once Abrams is finished.

Water Sources— In addition to water from Lavon, Bonham and Texoma a pipeline is being built from Tawakoni and wetlands to provide additional water.

Street Closings — City leaders reported that Richardson has a very old process for determining closures. The city is now re-evaluating how to determine closures but no date has been set for a new process to be available.

Neighborhood Lighting—Although Richland Park/Oaks lighting meets current city specs., residents want to work with the city to improve lighting. The HOA will form a committee to represent our neighborhood.

Trash collection discount is available if you're 65-plus

How would you like a discount on your trash collection fee? You can get one by going to City Hall and filling out an application form in the Water and Sewer Customer Service Office, Room 101, 972-744-4120.

Whomever signs up for the exemption must be the person whose name is on the City's water account—however, if you are a married couple, either of you may complete the form. You'll need identification to prove your age and your last city services bill.

With the discount, the charge for residential trash collection, including tax and the state-mandated landfill fee, is \$10.63. The same charge without the discount is \$13.29.

Need a pick-up at your curb?

You've done lots of yard work, cleaned out your garage and have a bunch of trash to send somewhere. The City will collect your bulky items on Mondays **if you call in advance.** It will not happen unless you make that call.

Call 972-744-4111 and leave a voice mail 24 hours a day. You must, however, call before midnight on your collection day (for our neighborhood that's Sunday night).

Audelia Street Entrances:

The City of Richardson (COR) will start modifying the sprinkler system to accommodate the new stonework design. We start planting new evergreen foliage, grasses and other plant material in the spring.

Walnut Street Entrances:

All three entrance beds are complete (Lois Lane, Richland Park, Richland Oaks). Richland Park and Richland Oaks signage has been removed to make way for the new entry wall design and new signage.

Screening Walls, Signage & the Walnut Street Center Medians

We plan to meet with the COR in April to discuss the development of our screening walls and medians. New designs will be introduced and construction is estimated for August 2008.

Letters

The first two letters below continue a discussion that began last fall about walkers who use streets rather than the sidewalks.

To address Mr. Theobold's concern about walkers in our streets, there are three reasons pedestrians may use the street, rather than the sidewalks:

- 1. Brush from tree clippings often blocks the sidewalks.
- 2. Sprinklers are frequently on in the mornings and evenings.
- 3. Sidewalks are uneven, and street lights scarce. Tripping is a real hazard.

I can also empathize with families who push strollers in the street. Many of our curbs do not have wheelchair gradients, and pushing a stroller over them is difficult.

The solution to this problem is to push our city council to fix the sidewalks and install more lighting. One street light per block is not enough. Adding more lights would reduce crime and make us all safer.

Until then, please remember that the law requires drivers to yield to pedestrians.

As you may know, the City of Richardson has earned the National Night Out Cup for placing first in the nation in National Night Out Against Crime activities and participation. Richardson serves as a national model for Crime Watch groups across the country. AND, the Richland Park/Oaks Crime Watch group serves as a model for Richardson.

Crime Watch Patrol offers anti-crime tips and suggestions

Hope everyone had a great holiday season. As you should know, December and January are HIGH CRIME months. In December the crooks want to take what you have bought for Christmas and give it to their families. In January they want to take your items and pawn them for cash. If you placed empty boxes of your XBOX, TV, POWER TOOLS, etc., in your trash area (as MANY of you did) you will have a one in ten chance of someone trying to take it from you.

As I drove on patrol just after Christmas I noticed a lot of boxes in alleys of just this type along with the box from your new Plasma TV's, NEW COMPUTERS, and so on. Please don't advertise what you have to the crooks. Cut up the box, fold it inside out, tape it shut and put it in a black plastic bag. The crooks drive the alley just as I do on patrol and take notes to come back when you are gone.

Have you walked out in your alley at night lately? What did you see? Couldn't see much, could you? It was too DARK. Please try to leave your rear flood lights on. I know it costs a little more, but there are low wattage bulbs available to help with that. Isn't it worth a few bucks a month to have your entire car together when you go out in the morning? You know—it still has a radio, tires, wheels, air bags, etc. You can also get a sensor at Home Depot to turn outside lights on at dusk and off a dawn for about \$10. You can't buy insurance that cheaply.

During our neighborhood Spring events this year I plan to have extra patrols on the street for your safety and state of mind so stay as long as you want. Your CRIME WATCH will be at work.

On a last note, we need some new CRIME WATCH patrol members. We have had a few move away and need to replace them. It takes only a couple of hours every two weeks. It's a great way to meet your neighbors and do a great service at the same time. Please rest assured that you are in no danger whatsoever. You DO NOT confront anyone! There is a new class offered by the Richardson Police Department starting April 7 and 14 at 7 p.m. at the civic center.

Richland Park Crime Watch Patrol

Statistics indicate that crime goes down if there is an active crime watch patrol. Our patrol was begun in 1994 and we all feel a little safer.
