Please come and join us at the Fall Festival! There is no telling what might happen.!



They reportedly pick on homeowners' pets, destroy vegetation and generally make a nuisance of themselves.

Neighbors are asked to please keep pets humanely confined.

The News has also been asked to remind pet owners that not cleaning up after their pets during walks in the neighborhood or in the park/playground area is against the law in Richardson.

The city has provided containers of plastic "poop" bags at several locations in the park. Please use them.

Abrams Road improvements to cause lane shut downs

All residents should have received a letter from the City of Richardson with projected dates for closing north and southbound Abrams Road for two or three days at a time.

Detours to Greenville, Tiffany, Sheffield, Birch, Fieldwood and Park Bend have been mapped and signage created to help drivers negotiate the lane closings. Work will be done from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to accelerate the paving operation and reduce the number of necessary detour days.

The City of Richardson is also working with Richland Elementary to minimize any student-related traffic issues.

The Abrams Road project is expected to be completed by early 2008.

New information update about area solid waste drop-offs

Residents can drop off waste materials including rugs, tile and furniture twice a month at all three transfer stations. Stations are located at 1601 E. Lookout, Richardson; 4030 W. Plano Pkwy, Plano & 9901 Custer Rd., Plano.

Effective Aug. 1, brush and untreated/unpainted wood or fence panels are accepted <u>only</u> at the Custer Road transfer station.

Richardson residents must provide a driver's license and a current or prior month water bill to use transfer station services. For questions, call 972-442-5405.

Brush and bulky items can also be disposed of by placing them on the front curb after calling for a special pick-up. Call 972-744-4111 or request pick-up via the city's web site at www.cor.net. These items will be collected on the next recycling day after the request is made.

Time-of-day watering info. causes confusion

All water restrictions have now been lifted for City of Richardson residents including what time of day you may water.

Assistant City Manager, David Morgan, reports some confusion about keeping the "no watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m." restriction in place.

This restriction is being considered by the Richardson City Council but no action has been taken to reinstate it at this time. If it is reinstated, Morgan says, it is likely to be part of an ongoing water conservation plan.

Common sense measures should continue like: turning sprinklers off in periods of sufficient rain; avoiding watering during the heat of the day when evaporation reduces its effectiveness; and being aware when your water is running wastefully down the street or alley.

Home repair scams can cost you thousands

"Richardson Today" reports that home repair scammers, the professional con artists who specialize in cheating elderly homeowners, should be reported to the police.

Scammers find victims by driving the neighborhoods or knocking on doors offering things like driveway paving/repair, roof/chimney repair, fixes for foundations, waterproofing, tree pruning, disease and pest control and more at a "special" price.

The job is finished quickly but often costs much more money than the agreed upon price. Checks are cashed long before the homeowner realizes that the "repair" is only cosmetic and completely substandard.

The City of Richardson requires all solicitors to obtain and display a city permit. This is the homeowner's first line of defense against home repair scammers.

Scam Tip-offs:

You are approached in your yard or at your door.

You are offered a "great deal," a special price or told that it "won't cost much.

They say they have leftover materials from a previous job, a special spray sealant for your roof, or a machine to drive out rodents.

No contract is furnished; no written estimate or itemized bill is provided.

Receipts are hand-written with no company logo visible.

They drive unmarked pick-up trucks with no markings or signage.

They may have women and children with them to ease suspicion.

Call 9-1-1 or 972-744-4800 to report a scam to the Richardson Police Department.

Keep your eyes wide open

Letters

My family moved to Richardson in July 2005 after 19 years in Mesquite. Our experience in Richardson has not been dull by any stretch of the imagination. We love living in Richardson—it is so centrally located to anything one would need and yet has a "small town" feel. It's the experience with the oddities in our neighborhood that we find amusing.

In the two years we have lived in Richardson, we have called the police five times. Once we called because our neighbors had left their garage door open in the dark of night. We didn't know much about them other than they had a baby. After we noticed the garage door opened for over an hour, and that the door leading from the garage to the house was also opened, and not knowing what we might find inside if we had gone in, and taking the risk that we might make enemies of these neighbors, we called the police to investigate. We have since traded phone numbers and although we laugh about it now, at the time it was very scary for the wife. But, they appreciated our attentiveness.

Then we called the police because we were victims of identity theft. You know, those pesky credit card companies that send out convenience checks with their bills without your knowledge. Well, they were stolen from our mailbox and two of them used. Several months later we thought we heard a gunshot and called the police only to learn that a nearby transformer had blown. This year, near the end of winter, we heard what we thought was a bomb. We immediately went outside and found that our neighbor's car had been hit. The driver did not stop. The car belonged to their daughter who had the car for only six months.

They, too, were appreciative of our attentiveness.

None of these incidents tops what happened Aug. 6. My husband was out volunteering. Our doorbell rang at sunset. I answered with r

was out volunteering. Our doorbell rang at sunset. I answered with my daughter behind me. She was holding our dog who was absolutely crazy barking. The man at the door explained that his wife had a wreck about a mile away and he needed \$2 to \$3 for gas money. I wondered what having a wreck had to do with needing gas money. He was very out of breath and said several neighbors had already helped him. He even offered identification but that did not reassure me. I was so taken aback about having a panhandler at my door that I told him we didn't have anything, closed the door and called the Richardson police who responded, as they have at other times, quickly and professionally. As I watched the man go down the street, he did not go to my next door neighbors who are elderly; he went to the house next to them. I believe he had gone to at least six or eight neighbors before arriving at our door. When I couldn't go to sleep that night because the the evening's events, I began to wonder why none of my neighbors before our house had called the police. I shudder to think what would have happened if the man had actually gone to my elderly neighbors' door. Would he have overpowered them and harmed them in some way? Was this man scoping out houses to break into? Maybe it was as innocent as getting money for groceries, or alcohol or whatever, but how many people does it take to believe that this man's actions were innocent?

Neighborhood. What does that mean? To me, it means paying attention to your surroundings. One does not need to become best friends with their neighbors, but we at least owe each other a safe place to live. We have a responsive police force in Richardson and our neighborhood crime watch group is very active. But they cannot do it all. **If something out of the ordinary arises, pay attention and take action. You might be saving someone's property. You might be saving someone's life!**

Hello Neighbors,

Walnut Street Entrances:

As you can see, we continue with our Richland Park/Oaks Entrance project (PHASE 1).

Let me update you on the progress! And what's to come.

We are starting the Landscaping and Lighting Installation at each main entryway. The next part of PHASE 1 will be landscaping and constructing the <u>medians</u> at both entrances.

Note: Pre-construction and Landscape planning consisted of Tree Trimming and Irrigation.

July's weather conditions and torrential rains delayed our construction and landscaping schedule. Fortunately we fell only 1-week behind on "Project Stonework" construction.

Planting will begin the first week of September with hardy-evergreen and decorative foliage. Seasonal color will be planted at the end of September/early October. We are also adding sectioned-off beds for planting and River Stone. We are adding a 1" steel border around the outside edges of each entrance bed allowing minimal dirt overflow while providing architectural detailing. Wall coping will added to the tops of the concrete wall. SOLAR Lighting Bollards and Down-lights are on order and will be installed at each entrance. All three entrances have been properly irrigated and the COR has increased the watering time to 30 minutes, 3-times a week, (Sun., Tues. and Thurs. nights about 11 p.m. for 30 minutes. per station)

Additional landscaping will include shaping the existing foliage on the medians and re-shaping the beds along Walnut.

Audelia Street Entrances:

The entrances on Audelia are placed temporarily on hold until third quarter (October). The importance lies in finishing the entrance projects on Walnut. We are working on fabricating a design that will accommodate the smaller bedding areas and the

closing of entrances.

Sidewalks and Streets:

Sidewalks are continuing to be fixed. The City has a program called "TRIP Fund.." This fund allows budgeting for sidewalks and streets. They are in the process of finalizing the construction package. Once the bids are in from various contractors, the awarded team will have approximately six months to finish these modifications.

Update on Entrance Screening Walls (Phase 2)

COR Vitality Program:

The City of Richardson continues to work on several vitality programs. Before they begin on our Entrance Screening Walls, several of their current projects need to progress further.

The wall on Belt Line is moving along and should be complete within the next few months. They are also finalizing construction drawings on two other projects and will move forward to the bidding phase shortly. We are ahead of the game with a lot of the preliminary design work already completed. The city plans to move forward with to the Richland Park/Oaks project and a few others that are at a similar stage. The city staff will meet in the coming weeks and we'll attempt to settle on a timeline. A set timeline is difficult due to a lot of variables in the planning, design

and construction process .







Resident Cars on Street

<u>SIDEWALKS</u>: Please take the time to maintain the over run of soil and debris that gathers weekly along our running and walking paths. We can all appreciate a nice walk or stroll in a clean environment.

STREETS: There is an increase in vehicles parked throughout the Richland Park/Oaks community. Please try to keep our streets clear of vehicles for long periods of time. 
