GARAGE SALE PERMITS AT RESIDENTIAL PROPERTIES

Plan on having a garage sale now that the weather is getting cooler? Don't forget to pick up your garage sale permit from the city. Ordinance 3857 requires all people who hold a garage sale to obtain a permit by



midnight the day of the sale. No fee will be required for the permit. The ordinance also limits garage sales to a maximum of three in any 12-month period at the same address, and no resident may conduct more than three garage sales in any 12-month period. The garage sales cannot exceed seventy-two hours in duration, and at least four business

CRIME WATCHVOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Richland Park/Oaks Crime Watch needs more volunteers to help patrol our neighborhood. We have fairly good coverage during the daytime, but are in need of help for nighttime. Unfortunately, late night is when we experience most of our problems. Therefore, we need more volunteers at night, every day of the week. This is a great way to get out, meet new people, learn new things and experience something different in life.

In order to join the Crime Watch Patrol, you will need to fill out an *application form* which we submit to the Richardson Police Department. The police will run a criminal background check on each applicant. Once all the paperwork has been cleared, the applicant will receive about six hours of training. All new applicants will also be assigned a patrol partner.

Crime Watch Patrols are extremely effective because criminals do not want to get caught by anyone, police or otherwise. So when you put those reflective signs on your cars and patrol the neighborhood, the bad guys tend to go some place else. The problem is we need to maintain these patrols at all hours in order to keep crime away.

Each shift usually consists of one and half hours of patrol time every other week (total of 3 hours per month.) The two shifts where we need the most help are evenings (7 p.m. to midnight) and deep nights (midnight to 6:00 a.m.).

12 THINGS THAT MAKE A NEIGHBORHOOD GREAT

10) SHOPPING/RESTAURANTS

11) NIGHTLIFE/ENTERTAINMENT

A Walk with the Mayor


On Saturday, July 10th, Mayor Paul Voelker hosted his first "*A Walk with the Mayor*" event.

Performance Award – Given to the entry that does an outstanding, entertaining, crowd-pleasing performance during the parade!



Crime Prevention Tips for Garage S

- Obtain a City of Richardson Garage Sale Permit at www.cor.net from the Community Services, Code Enforcement link.
- Have two or more people working the sale. Be aware that criminals may work in teams in an attempt to distract you or overwhelm you with customers, to commit a crime.
- Keep your cellphone with you at all times for emergencies. Remember to use your camera phone to capture license plates
- Place smaller, more expensive items next to your checkout table.
- Place large items around the perimeter of the sale so that you can easily see the sale area and there are no concealment
- Have a discussion with your family, including children about vehicle safety due to increased traffic around the neighbor-
- Communicate to your neighbors that you will be having a sale. Encourage neighbors to close their garage doors to reduce the chance of a criminal taking advantage of an open door opportunity. Also remind them to report suspicious activity to 9-
- Watch for customers blocking alleys with their vehicles, post signs asking visitors to not block the alley or driveways. Politely remind them or contact police for assistance. Blocking an alley is a safety concern for first responders in the event of an
- Cover items or remove them from your garage if they are valuable or not for sale. It's better to hold your sale outside of the garage to keep strangers from entering your home or having access to an interior door.
- Keep pets secure.
- Never leave your sale unattended.
- Consider purchasing a counterfeit bill detector pen from an office supply store.
- Keep a minimal amount of cash on hand. Avoid having a cashbox visible and never make change with a customer next to you so they can see the amount of cash you have collected. Only keep enough change for \$20.00. For larger transactions consider telling the person you will hold the item until they can return with the correct amount. Take large bills or collected amounts of money to a secure location inside your home while another person attends your sale. Avoid taking personal
- Avoid talking with customers about personal information or questions about your schedule, living situation, or what's in
- Keep doors and windows locked during your sale, do not let people use your house for any reason, including trying on clothes, testing a small appliance to see if it works, using the bathroom.
- Keep gates locked that lead into your backyard.
- Good customer services is also a great crime prevention technique, greet all customers, so they know they have been seen.
- Take down your signs around the neighborhood after the sale.

GREENVILLE AVENUE MOBILITY IMPROVEMENTS

On August 21, 2019, your RNA Board Members attended the open house for the Collins/Arapaho Transit-Oriented Development and Innovation District Study. It is a City-initiated visioning effort for an approximate 1,200-acre area, generally bounded by Central Expressway (US 75), Campbell Road, Plano Road, and Apollo Road. Information and ideas have been collected over the past 16 months to figure out zoning regulations for the district.


This area is the heart of the Telecom Corridor* and has been a job center and hub of technology and innovation in the region, and continues to be home to both local and international businesses. The Arapaho Center DART Station is within this District and serves as a major opportunity site for new transit-oriented development.

There are four main areas within this hub, and one area on Greenville Avenue will initiate a temporary demonstration project to improve the connectivity, mobility and safety around the Arapaho Center Station.

A key placemaking strategy identified in the Collins-Arapaho TOD and Innovation District Study is to redesign key streets for better mobility. Many streets in the District have excess capacity; Greenville Avenue for example is designed for 3 times the capacity it needs given current traffic counts. Redesigning these types of key street to make it easier to get around the District without a car will support greater activity.

In 2019, the City of Richardson was awarded a grant from AARP as part of the AARP Community Challenge Program to install temporary mobility improvements along Greenville Avenue. The AARP Community Challenge grant program is part of the nationwide AARP Livable Communities initiative that helps communities become great places to live for residents of all ages. The program is intended to help communities make immediate improvements and jump-start long-term progress in support of residents of all ages and abilities.

This grant will fund a temporary demonstration project to improve the connectivity, mobility and safety around the Arapaho Center Station. Temporary onstreet bike lanes will be installed on Greenville Avenue



from Campbell Road to Jackson Street, connecting the Core District, Chinatown, and Eastside to the Arapaho Center Station. One north-bound lane and one south-bound lane will be temporarily converted to bike lanes during this demonstration.

In addition, as part of this AARP grant a temporary atgrade crosswalk will be installed at the light rail station as a secondary point of access to the underground tunnel to improve the connectivity and access for transit riders of all ages and abilities. Currently, transit riders must use the underground tunnel to access the DART bus station, parking, or business in the Innovation District. The existing underground tunnel, ramps, and stairs can be challenging for those with impediments to mobility, and this AARP demonstration will test the effectiveness of an at-grade crosswalk and the preference of transit riders.

The purpose of this temporary demonstration project is to test the effectiveness of the improvements and collect data to better inform our decision-making process to potentially install improvements permanently. In addition to this AARP demonstration project, the City is studying the traffic counts, speeds, and pedestrian counts along the Greenville Avenue corridor before the temporary demonstration and during the demonstration.

The duration of the temporary demonstration is approximately 60 days. Following this, City Council will evaluate the project's effectiveness and any potential permanent improvements.

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












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
